


*An IAM RoadSmart member is someone who has passed the advanced driving or riding test.

An associate is someone who is preparing to take the advanced driving or riding test.




Q4: Where do you live?




Q5: Which vehicle do you predominantly use?




Q6: Do you drink alcohol?




Q7: How much of a priority do you think the Christmas drink-drive campaign should be for the police compared to other times of the year?




Q8: As a result of the police running a Christmas drink-drive campaign does it make you think twice about drinking even a small amount of alcohol and then driving during the festive season?




Q9: During the weeks leading up to Christmas day are you likely to:




Q10: During the weeks leading up to Christmas Day how likely are you to drive after drinking compared with other times of the year:




Q11: Between Christmas Eve and New Year's Day are you likely to:




Q12: Between Christmas Eve and New Year's Day how likely are you to drive after drinking compared with other times of the year?




Q13: The police have some existing powers to conduct breath tests after incidents or if they have suspicions that a driver may have been drinking. Which one of the following statements do you support?
