
I have just purchased an upgraded projector for the Group which will be much brighter and with better definition than our 2004 model. Do come along to our next meeting on 2nd May and see the difference.

Somewhere along the line we have launched headlong into the year, the clocks have moved forwards (maybe for the last time), and show season is not far away.



## Notes from the Chief Observer

#### **Fixed Speed Cameras**

The first speed camera – or safety camera, to use the official terminology – was installed on the A316 over Twickenham bridge in 1992. It was a Gatso device, & the trigger speed was set at 60mph: the A416 had a 40mph speed limit. 22 days after being turned on, it caught nearly 23,000 drivers speeding at over 65mph.

Figures from the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents (RoSPA) reveal inappropriate speed contributes to 12% of all injuries, 15% of serious injuries & 26% of deaths on the road.

The law states that you are liable for a speeding fine when you exceed the limit, so if you're doing 31mph in a 30 limit for example, you're breaking the law & could receive a fine.

The National Police Chiefs' Council (NPCC) suggests giving drivers '10% plus 2' leeway, to aid police officers in using 'discretion', however, it is a recommendation, **not the law**. This is totally dependent on the officer who catches the speeder, & it is up to them whether to fine the offender or not. It can also depend on the area's policy AND the attitude of the driver!

#### **Mobile Speed Cameras**

The majority are run by local police forces & reside on accident blackspots where there is a history of road traffic incidents over a three year or more period. There are also mobile speed cameras used as part of safety camera partnership teams & speed safety campaigns. These cameras can take on a number of forms, working from marked or unmarked cars, as well as being manually operated by police officers using radar guns & laser guns.

#### **FAQs**

#### Q. How far away does a mobile speed camera work from?

A. On a straight section of road the typical range for a mobile speed camera is two miles. They can't, however, record around bends or over brows of hills.

#### Q. Can you get caught behind another car?

A. As long as the speed camera operator can see and target your vehicle they will be able to get a reading of your speed. This is because the laser beam emitted by a mobile speed camera when it hits your vehicle, can be as small as 10cm in diameter

#### **Average Speed Cameras (SPECS Cameras)**

Introduced in 1999, these are becoming an increasingly common on UK roads. They use Automatic Number Plate Reading (ANPR) digital technology to record a date/time stamp as you pass between two cameras, enabling the computer to calculate your average speed.

Figures suggest that 263 miles of the UK's roads are covered by permanent average speed cameras, including the 99-mile stretch on the A9! Plus those for long-term roadworks.

#### Bank holiday getaway

#### **Tips from IAM RoadSmart**

If you're planning a bank holiday getaway then be sure to read our tips on how you can make your journey a safe and stress-free one. Here's IAM RoadSmart's head of driving and riding standards, Richard Gladman, to help you prepare for your trip.

A little preparation goes a long way.



- Take some time to check your vehicle inside and out before you set off. Check the tyre pressure and fluid levels are right and make sure your car ancillaries are working properly
- Secure your luggage in your boot so it's out of the way and doesn't obstruct your view
- Give yourself plenty of time for the journey and check the news for any traffic updates and roadworks nearby
- If you're travelling during the early hours of the day or late in the evening make sure you take some rest beforehand and eat something light so you don't feel sluggish before you leave
- If you plan on using a sat-nav don't forget to programme in the destination before
  you leave and check it. Leave plenty of time for the journey so you don't find
  yourself pushed for time.
- Make sure you take regular rest breaks to split up the journey when driving on a long, boring stretch of a motorway. It's good practise to stop at least every two hours

Richard said: "With so much planning involved in a holiday, many of us forget about the first bit – how we get to our destination.

"If your journey is a long one, take some time to plan where and when you will be taking a break – just so you can get a little rest and have some water to stay hydrated. Enjoy the journey and more importantly, enjoy the getaway."

#### **Do Not Disturb!**


Police forces across the UK will step up efforts to catch drivers using a mobile phone next week, as part of a nationwide campaign.

The week-long campaign, which launches on Monday (15 April), is being coordinated by the National Police Chiefs' Council (NPCC) – with a warning that one moment of distraction can lead to 'devastating consequences'.

The NPCC says enforcement activity will be stepped up during the campaign, to ensure that motorists adhere to 'road safety rules'.

In Avon and Somerset, police officers will use the campaign to remind drivers of the penalties given to those who use their mobile phone at the wheel.

Drivers are also being encouraged to turn off their phones, lock them away in the glove box and switch on 'do not disturb' mode.



In the south east, Kent County Council's road safety team is running a month long campaign to remind drivers of the distraction that using a phone creates, straddling the enforcement focus from Kent Police.

The Kent campaign, in support of their police partners, is using On Demand TV, social media and small road side posters (pictured right) to highlight the impact that phone use can have on reaction times.

Meanwhile in Bedfordshire, Cambridgeshire and Hertfordshire, the message being shared by the police is 'don't be distracted, just drive'.

Sgt Ian Manley from local roads policing unit, said: "There are serious and sometimes fatal consequences of using your phone whilst behind the wheel.

"I would ask all drivers: is it really worth it? The answer is of course no so please turn your phone off, on do not disturb or put it where you won't be distracted by it or be tempted to pick it up."

Since 2016, drivers caught using their mobile phone face being given six points on their licence, and a £200 fine.

CC Anthony Bangham, NPCC lead for roads policing, said: "Driving while distracted by a mobile phone is completely unacceptable and puts everyone on the roads at risk of serious harm, one moment of distraction can lead to devastating consequences.

"There are tougher penalties now in place to clamp down on this dangerous behaviour and police forces across the UK will step up enforcement activity during this mobile phone operation period.

"Forces already work all year round to ensure motorists adhere to roads safety rules, which are in place to protect the public."
