

March Meeting Are You Sitting Comfortably?

Then I'll begin. No it's not Listen With Mother (for those of you who remember the radio programme on the old Home service). We were to have had a talk from the West Yorkshire 4x4 Volunteers but the previous week we had a little bit of snow so the volunteers were kept busy and as a result were unable to make it to the meeting. However they will be able to talk at next month's meeting on 9th April (Weather permitting!).

Instead our chairman Janice gave an impromptu talk / question and answer session on a couple of topics that we rarely think about when we're driving.

Firstly do you suffer from back problems or headaches after driving for any length of time? If so it may be your seating position that needs adjusting. No two people are the same when it comes to their driving position so it's important to adjust the seat correctly especially if more than one person drives the car. Janice suggested that the seat base should be level and went on to say that if the seat back was at the wrong angle this could result in neck problems and demonstrated the three curves of the spine on a "willing" volunteer.

The position of the steering wheel is also important for a comfortable driving experience. Fortunately most modern cars have adjustable rake and reach for the steering column in addition to better seating compared with cars from 20 - 30 years ago.

It's also important to have the correct seat position for the passenger, again to avoid back problems.

Do you feel stiff when you get out of the car? Try stretching your body and walking around the car a few times after getting out.

The second aspect covered by Janice was do you drink enough water? It may seem contradictory but not drinking enough water could actually lead to more frequent toilet stops as your bladder wants to get rid of the concentrated urine. Drinking water dilutes the urine leading to a lower need for your bladder to be emptied.

Failure to drink sufficient water can cause your body to start drawing water from parts of the body such as the discs in your spine leading once again to back problems. Drinking plenty of water can also help with gout which is caused by a build up of uric acid in the joints. The water dilutes the blood which can help disperse the uric acid.

So getting the driving position correct and drinking plenty of water can improve your comfort on long journeys. It certainly gave me something to think about.

IAM News Releases and Tips

A Checklist to Towing a Trailer Safely



On average there are 4,809 towing incidents annually which commonly occur on motorways and major A-roads. So to help you stay safe on the road, this month's tips are packed with towing advice, courtesy of the <u>National Trailer and Towing Association</u>.

Towing a vehicle

The trailer operator or the driver of the towing vehicle, if different, has the responsibility for the safe operation of the trailer and needs to carry out the following checks:

Be sure to check that your driving licence entitles you to tow the combination of a vehicle and trailer.

Have you checked the weight? Remember to ensure that the load you intend to carry is within the trailer's official payload.

Bear in mind that the actual gross weight being towed needs to be within the towing vehicle manufacturer's recommended maximum towing limit (whether braked or unbraked).

Trailer checks before each journey

If the trailer is laden, is the load correctly distributed and secure? To stop your trailer from being unstable, spread the load across the board and avoid having too much or too little nose weight. Even a heavy load will need to be strapped down, as gravity itself is not enough.

Before you set off, check that your lights are working correctly and are damage-free. Whilst doing this, also check that the lighting cable and plug are in good condition.

Be sure the correct number plate is fitted. This should be the same registration number as your vehicle and needs to conform to DVLA Standards.

Check that your breakaway cable or secondary coupling is undamaged and connected correctly to a suitable point on the tow bar or towing vehicle. As well as inspecting for damage, make sure that the trailer is correctly coupled to the towball or pin.

The tyre pressure must be correct and all tyres free from cuts, bulges and with adequate tread (including the spare). Remember, tyres must have a continuous tread depth of at least 1.6mm on cars, light vans and trailers, across the centre three-quarters of the width.

It's crucial that the wheel nuts and bolts are tightened to the correct torque for safety and for a smooth journey.

If required, are the mudguards secure and in satisfactory condition?

Take into consideration the size of your vehicle and the trailer. Is the coupling height correct? Check that your trailer is not excessively nose down or nose up. If your vehicle and trailer don't align, get an adjustment plate to accommodate this issue.

Be aware of the national speed limit for a vehicle towing a trailer. The maximum speed limit on a single carriageway road is 50mph, and 60mph on a dual carriageway or motorway.

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Many manufacturers offer a tow bar as an option on a new car but if you are fitting or are having a towbar fitted to a modern car often the electrical connections will have to be coded to the cars electrical system. This will usually include the trailer into the cars stability system, disable the car's rear parking sensors and transfer the rear fog light from the car to the trailer and often the trailer will be included in the cars alarm system.

A Week in The Life of.....

How did the recent spell of arctic weather affect you? We had a busy week carefully planned to coincide with the snow and low temperatures.

Thursday 22nd February – Take David to Halifax station to start his weeks holiday in France and Spain. Wave him goodbye promising to pick him up from Manchester airport the following Friday. Drive to Hardcastle Cragg / Gibson Mill to take the dog for a walk. Take a few pictures to accompany an article in a future newsletter. Dog jumps into the river and cannot get out so is dragged out and promptly shows her appreciation by shaking water all over me.

Friday 23rd February – Having decided to spend some of my pension lump sum on replacing the windows in the house and updating our old, obsolete and sometimes unreliable, alarm system it's time to clear space around the windows and find somewhere to store all the items moved.

Saturday 24th February – Continue moving stuff around and note that the weather forecast is not looking good for next week.

Sunday 25th February – The usual Sunday shop plus a visit to the petrol station in preparation for next Fridays trip to Manchester.

Monday 26th February – Up early as the alarm people are coming to install the new alarm. It's cold but the alarm is installed and demonstrated by the early afternoon. One sensor to be fitted later on a window due to be replaced.

Tuesday 27th February – David's birthday. Send him birthday wishes by text. It's also snowing, so not looking good for tomorrow when the window fitters are due. Our school teacher daughter arrives at school to be told the school is closing for the day.

Wednesday 28th February – Daughters birthday. Up early as the window fitters are due between 8 and 10am. More snow outside. Start clearing snow from the drive and road when the fitters walk down the road and begin clearing snow a lot faster than me. They reverse their two vans down the road and start installing the upstairs windows. It's cold with occasional snow but they get on with the job leaving early afternoon promising to return tomorrow to fit the remaining windows. Daughter calls to say she is coming over as she's going to see War Horse at the Alhambra in the evening. She starts walking here and we agree I'll pick her up at the Keelham Farm shop. Her boyfriend will come over later when he's finished work. Take both of them to the Alhambra and pick them up after the performance. No problems with the roads although they are covered in slushy snow.

Thursday 1st March – Even more snow, up to 12" drifts in front of the house. Up early and start clearing snow. It's soon obvious that the window fitters will not be coming. Ring the window company who have been having problems with scheduled installations. They'll try again tomorrow. Weather conditions cause the M62 to be closed stranding hundreds of motorists. One route to Manchester airport is closed so start looking for alternatives ready for tomorrow. It's either up the

A646 to the A56/M66, M60, the long route, or the shorter route A58 to the M66/M60 or David can catch the train from the airport to Halifax.


Friday 2nd March – Up early again. No overnight snow so road remains fairly clear. Window fitters turn up and start installing the downstairs windows and new porch, in between trying to thaw their frozen hands. Text David to tell him of the alternative ways to get home. Track his flight from Barcelona to Manchester which lands around 3pm. The fitters are just about finished when David calls. He's ready to be picked up, there are no trans-Pennine trains running so it's pick up by car or spend the night in the airport and hope it's better in the morning. The window fitters leave so I set off to Manchester at 4pm. Decide to try the A58 route but get to Riponden to find signs informing me that the A58 is closed. Take an alternative road that runs alongside the M62 only to find that is also closed. So turn round and back to Sowerby Bridge and get onto the A646 which is busy but moving. At Todmorden take the A6033 to rejoin the A58 then onto the M66 and the M60(W), M56 to the airport. Pick up David and return home following the same route noting there was very little snow on the other side of the Pennines finally arriving home at 8:30pm.

I had been prepared for the journey with a fully charged phone, flask of tea, wellies, shovel and some food but didn't need them. The emergency services managed to clear the M62 which finally re-opened early on Saturday morning.

While checking the RAC website, <u>https://www.rac.co.uk/route-planner/traffic-news/m62/</u>, for the state of the M62 during the recent bad weather I spotted this slight error.

There is also a section of the motorway, between Manchester and Leeds,

that runs through the Pennines and rises to over 300 miles above sea level in places.

I knew that one section of the M62 is the highest motorway in the country but I didn't realise it was that high! Someone is getting their metres and miles confused. Must remember my oxygen mask next time I travel that way. (The highest point on the motorway is actually 372m (1221ft) above sea level) (Note that the error has now been corrected)

I also found a useful website for tracking aircraft flights. So if you are picking someone up from the airport try <u>https://uk.flightaware.com/live/</u> for the status and current location of the flight before setting off.
