The Manor Golf Club is situated on the B6135, half a mile off the A650. If travelling from M62, M621 exit at Junction 27 onto the A650 to Bradford. At the second roundabout take the third exit onto the B6135, the entrance is on the left, immediately after the change in speed limit to 40.

From the A58 Leeds turn right at the traffic lights in Drighlington towards Bradford and the entrance is on the right immediately before the national speed limit sign.

From A58 Halifax turn left at the traffic lights in Drighlington towards Bradford and the entrance is on the right immediately before the national speed limit sign.

## AN EVENING WITH THE CHIEF OBSERVER

We are going to try something a little different for the social meeting on 1<sup>st</sup> August at the Manor. We are holding "An Evening with the Chief Observer" David Stringer.

Between 7.30 and 8.30 David will be giving a presentation covering many aspects of advanced driving. It is a draft of a new associate theory presentation we are developing, parts of which will be available on the group website eventually, and it will appeal and be useful to members and associates alike.

Also between 7.30 and 8.30 David Rushfirth will be organising training drives for the observers who will critique their own driving and observing. This will appeal to current and trainee observers **but also potential observers** who will have the chance to find out what is involved.

Between 8.30 and 9.30 the observers will be available to provide check drives and observed drives for anyone who has been at the presentation and would like to refresh on any aspect of driving.

In order to accommodate the extra activities we will be starting at 7:30pm rather than the usual 8:00pm.



Sergeant James Farrar from West Yorkshire Police visited to give his emotive presentation he takes round to schools, his 'One Life Lost is One Too Many' campaign which is aimed at 16-18 year olds.

As James started to speak it became obvious how passionate he is to get his message out to young teenagers. It was after attending tragic accidents in the Wakefield district, that James created the campaign to send a powerful message to youngsters to 'think' when getting in a car, either as a passenger or driver and what the consequences of their actions could be.

James delivery concentrates on the 'Fatal 4' – speeding, drink/drug driving, no seatbelt and use of a mobile device and how they can impact on their lives, their future, those around them if involved in an RTA.

James backed his words up with pictures of the aftermath of crashes he had attended. It's not just the damage to the vehicle, higher insurance premiums, maybe loss of license, possibly a criminal record and poor career prospects. It's the loss of life which is the hardest to deal with, when James gets to this point when delivering in schools; he gets a body bag out and reads a victim statement from a Mum who lost her son.

We were all silent listening to the crushing words this brave Mum had delivered in court on the devastation and how it had affected her, family, friends. Powerful words that James admitted still chokes him every time he reads it out on his talks.



James' admits they will never know just how well the campaign has been and even if it's only ever saved one person it will have been worth it. One Life Lost is One Too Many has been very well received and is now being pushed out throughout the district.

On a lighter note - look out for

# Road rage – don't be a victim

In this week's driving tips IAM RoadSmart head of standards Richard Gladman talks about how to avoid becoming a road rage victim, and what to do if it does escalate.



If someone is being confrontational or aggressive, don't make eye contact and don't react visibly.

Let the other driver go on ahead. You might feel wronged, but letting the other party go will make no difference to the rest of your day.

Name and shame! If you or better, your passengers, can film any behaviour on your mobile phone it will help in terms of evidence, including the registration number of the other vehicle involved.

If the conflict is more serious and other processes aren't working; call the police, especially if you feel there is a threat or possibility of violence against you. Sorry helps. If you were at fault, admit it and apologise. If you feel upset or emotional pull over and get some fresh air or walk around if you need to before resuming your journey.

Again find some distraction, like listening to the radio - move your mind deliberately onto something else – deliberately driving well would be a good example – but don't dwell on the incident.

Richard said: "Road rage does not affect everyone every day. If you're finding it is happening very often, you might want to think about how you engage with other road users."

He concluded: "No-one need experience road rage, but it us up to each of us to ensure it stays that way."



#### Never let it be said that ground crews and engineers lack a sense of humour.
