Happy Birthday to the M62

The 107 mile Liverpool to Hull motorway celebrated its 40th birthday this year. The trans-Pennine road linking the two cities had been first proposed in the 1930s but construction finally started in the 1960s, opening in stages between 1971 and 1976.

The original intention had been for the Liverpool end to link to an inner city motorway but this was never built so it terminates on the outskirts of the city. This explains why there are no junctions 1 to 3. Seven miles of its route are shared with the M60 Manchester orbital motorway. Along its route it also links to the M6, M61, M66, A627(M), M606, M621, M1, A1(M) and M18. I'm sure that some of the junctions around Manchester are more complex to navigate than Spaghetti junction, but that's just my opinion.

Between junctions 22 and 23 the motorway reaches a height of 1221ft (372m) above sea level making it the highest motorway in the UK. Also between these two junctions is the Scammonden dam constructed from the earth removed from nearby Deanhead cutting. Stott Hall Farm, where the motorway carriageways diverge around the farm, is also located in this section. The common myth is that the farmer refused to sell to the



authorities but the truth is that it was always planned for the carriageways to diverge as geological surveys had found the local ground could not support the two carriageways side by side thus sparing the farm from demolition.

The Yorkshire section carries around 144,000 vehicles a day* and is prone to becoming gridlocked during peak times. Because of this, the section between junctions 25 and 30 has been converted to Smart motorways using the hard shoulder as an extra lane when necessary. The section around the M60-M62 is currently being converted.

It is a magnificent feat of engineering overcoming many obstacles during its construction including the winter weather in the Pennine section. Although many of us will complain when we get stuck in the frequent traffic jams just think what roads we would have to use if it weren't there and how long would it take us to cross the Pennines.

While researching the M62 I found this website which allows you to see how the traffic is flowing on the UKs motorways.

Winter was starting to make its presence felt when our own David Stringer delivered 'Winter Driving' at Novembers' social.

It's always good to have a reminder on what to think about beforehand and when we set out on the roads at this time of year.

David's slides were from an old IAM Confident Driving set but still relevant for todays' motorist. Low sun at this time of the year can be a pain - keep sunglasses to hand - be aware of hidden hazards - eye strain with reflection off wet surfaces, sunlight flashing through trees, bright light to shadows - dipped lights on for others to see you, remember <u>TakeUseGive don't rely on DRL's</u> - Windows clean!! All of them!!

Rain - surface water - aquaplaning - spray on motorways - stopping distances increase drastically - slow down - increase your gap consider using fog lights if visibility is below 100m's but don't forget to switch them off if conditions improve!



Flooded roads - how deep? - are there any potholes? - maybe watch another vehicle go

through first - look for clues with kerbs, posts, hedges, seats etc - do you know where your engines air intake is? - drive through slowly, keep revs high, on automatics select 1 if available and keep a foot on the brake and revs up on the accelerator - avoid bow waves off other vehicles - keep a firm steady grip on the wheel, flowing water can pick up a car - check brakes afterwards for efficiency.

Micro climates - there are walls, trees, bridges casting shadows, there may be slippier surfaces lurking, whether surface water, frost, leaves or black ice. Travelling past a body of water such as a lake, pond or river will have an effect on the temperature of the road nearby, expect it to be lower.

Mist & fog - it's easy to get mesmerised if you are following tail lights in front - increase your gap - dipped lights, fog lights if needed - drop your side window slightly, especially at junctions, you may hear before you see. Windows clean!! All of them!!

Snow, frost & ice - you should guess what's coming Windows clean!! All of them!! Also clear your bonnet, roof and boot of any snow, no fun if 2-3" of snow slides down or flies over the windscreen! - loosen or clear your wiper blades before switching them on, break them and you're going nowhere and possibly have scratched glass - check your soles for a build-up of ice or snow - allow extra time for the journey - there may be abandoned/broken down vehicles - in the car, radio on for travel alerts, securely in the back a high vis jacket, a warm coat and boots/wellies (don't drive in these) maybe food and a hot drink, torch, a charged mobile. In the boot a shovel and old carpet/sack pieces can be useful, jump leads (but check first if these can be used on your vehicle) - consider having winter tyres fitted, can be as good as having a 4x4 - driving on snow keep slow and steady, keep momentum going but remember stopping distances are going to be 10x + greater. Automatic boxes may let you creep to get traction, manuals try setting off in 2nd gear - don't use cruise control in slippery icy weather - vehicles one at a time on tricky hills.

High winds - will affect high sided vehicles, bikes (all), even pedestrians. Under/over bridges, look at the lay of the land either side in front of you - take care if overtaking, you will have been temporarily shielded - falling trees, flying debris, hoardings.

Vehicle checks are most important, consider having your vehicle serviced before winter sets in – good tyres are essential - know your warning lights - under bonnet fluid levels vital, especially the windscreen wash, some reservoirs are placed under the wing and may struggle to keep defrosted so keep to the recommended winter ratio when filling.

Plan your journey - Sat navs can be useful to find an alternative route – and finally... **You**! Are **you** in good health? Could any medication you've taken affect your driving?now off to clean my windows......

.....

All good sensible advice but I'll add one further item to be wary off - Gritting lorries. Don't follow a gritter too closely when it's gritting and be careful if you overtake one unless you like pebble dashed paintwork!

I also remember the Ford Escort we had. It was fitted with a heated windscreen and heated washer jets, so where did they fit the wash bottle? Yes under the nearside wing as far away from the heat of the engine as possible. I did think about fitting a heater to keep it from freezing but, using some simple O-Level calculations, the amount of power needed to unfreeze the bottle was far too high to be practical so I abandoned the idea.

MYAM Trophy 2017



This year the newly instated MYAM trophy is to be awarded to the member 'who has gone above and beyond' for their commitment to our group by nomination from the membership. Starting in January we will be introducing a points based system for this award. After discussion by the committee the following rules will apply.

- 1. The award is open to all members of the Mid Yorkshire Advanced Motorists, both full members and associates.
- 2. Committee members are eligible, subject to certain exclusions.
- 3. The award will be presented at the December social event to the member who has accumulated the greatest number of points over the preceding 12 months.
- 4. In order to accommodate the December presentation, the 12 month period over which points are accumulated will run from the 1st December to the 30th November of the following year. However contributions for the newsletter will be for the January to December issues.
- 5. Points will be awarded as follows
 - a) One point for attending any MYAM event. This includes the monthly social meeting, driving sessions, shows and events where MYAM is in attendance. All attendees must sign an attendance book to be eligible.
 - b) Three points for writing an item for the newsletter. Items written by committee members as part of their normal committee duties will not be eligible e.g. reports for the AGM, newsletter editor "from the editor" and "and finally" sections. However reports on the monthly meetings or general articles would be eligible.
 - c) Three points for introducing a new member. To claim these points let the membership secretary know if you introduce anyone to the group.
 - d) Six points for organising an event. The programme secretary, or acting programme secretary, would not be eligible for these points. Examples of eligible events are the questions for the Christmas quiz, visits to skid pans or track days.

We will run this points system throughout 2017 and review it next December.

The risk of using mobile phones while driving has been very prominent in the media recently, following the tragic quadruple fatality caused by an HGV driver using a phone at the wheel. From this point forward our insurer, IAM Surety, will be unable to offer our exclusive 'members only' insurance scheme to any members who obtain points for using a phone while driving. This will be a permanent exclusion. Please do be sure to inform your local groups, so everyone understands the position. We support this positive step towards making using a mobile phone while driving socially unacceptable.

<u>Nextbase Dashcam – an Update</u>

Last year I wrote in the newsletter about the Nextbase dashcam I'd bought so I thought I'd update you with my recent experiences of it.

Again I've had no "exciting" incidents that were worth saving but I did recently edit a journey to Keighley for my daughter to use for a lesson at the school where she teaches. However I did experience a problem with it earlier this year. When switched off, by disconnecting the power plug from the power socket in the car, it should display a screen saver then shut down, but it started to just shut down then restart usually several times before it finally went off. I also found it didn't close the last video file correctly making that file unviewable. This got worse and occasionally I'd get a "Low Battery" message, especially after a short journey. I put up with it for a while then a few of weeks ago I rang Nextbase. Although the operator suggested a few things, most of which I'd tried, he wasn't able to help and gave me the number of their technical office in South Wales. I rang them and within a few minutes the problem was identified as a failing battery, which I'd started to suspect, and a replacement battery was to be posted to me at no cost. They also emailed instructions for replacing the battery which looked fairly easy to do but needed a tool to open up the case. I was also told it needed some soldering. No problem I said as I've been used to using a soldering iron for the best part of 50 years!

The battery arrived first followed by the tool kit for opening the case (it also does phones, Ipods and anything which has an apparently sealed case). I sat down and within about 15 minutes had opened up the case, replaced the battery and re-assembled it. Now it shuts down and closes all the files correctly. So it's a big thumbs up for the service I've received from Nextbase. I don't know if you'd get the same service from some of the other companies that manufacture or distribute these cameras.

<u>Supermoon</u>

Did you see the recent supermoon and try to take a photo of it. I've tried taking photos of the moon over the last few years and it's not easy to get a good picture. The moon is incredibly bright which can upset many cameras.
