The Manor Golf Club is situated on the B6135, half a mile off the A650. If travelling from M62, M621 exit at Junction 27 onto the A650 to Bradford. At the second roundabout take the third exit onto the B6135, the entrance is on the left, immediately after the change in speed limit to 40.

From the A58 Leeds turn right at the traffic lights in Drighlington towards Bradford and the entrance is on the right immediately before the national speed limit sign.

From A58 Halifax turn left at the traffic lights in Drighlington towards Bradford and the entrance is on the right immediately before the national speed limit sign.

November Meeting whiteknights Yorkshire Blood Bikes

We had a visit on our latest social evening from the White Knights, Yorkshire Blood Bikes. They are a registered charity run by enthusiastic volunteers who offer their time and riding driving skills to deliver essential and also urgent medical supplies. This is not only blood but many other requirements which are needed, including the transfer of documents and medical files among a wide range of NHS requirements when it is out of hours.

The story of how they started follows, but firstly an introduction to our speaker who was Matthew Beynon-Tullet who is the PR & Communications Manager for the Northern Region, he was accompanied by Paranjit Bharaj, who is the North Region Blood on Board Manager.



How it all Started.

Vic Siswick was a biker, who in 2008 was undergoing cancer treatment and noticed that there seemed to be a lack of a service or provision to supply sample delivery. He then decided to set up and create the present-day charity which now provides a daily service from 19:00 hrs till 07:00 hrs. The important point here is the service fills a vital need outside the normal NHS hours.

This volunteer service designed to deliver samples and supplies to medical outlets, does two major roles. Firstly, as it is run by volunteers, it saves the NHS a great deal of money and secondly it provides an out of hours reliable service to deliver much needed and in many cases very urgent medical supplies. These vary from blood donations to medical samples, donor breast milk and anything related, for example drugs and human tissue samples, which needs time saving and immediate attention.

At present the group has 70 volunteer riders each of which all have the mandatory requirement of holding the Advanced Motor Cycling Test. The approximate running costs of the charity are about £40k a year. This is made up of fuel and maintenance costs which service the running of seven motorbikes which cover about 20k miles a year.

An added function was commenced in October 2017 when the Whiteknights began providing daily deliveries from Pinderfields Hospital to the Air Support Unit at Nostell in support of the Yorkshire Air Ambulance new "Blood on Board" initiative.

We have a motto where we say, "we don't like to say we saved a life, we like to say we hope we made a difference."

The Whiteknights is funded and supported solely through donations and charitable payments from commercial and industrial sources. It is vital therefore that fundraising is done on an ongoing and essential basis.

Well back in October to celebrate his 86th birthday he decided to walk along the Thames with the aim of raising £1000 for the British Legion.

But things didn't go exactly to plan after he met Paula Modeste while waiting for a train at Windsor station. They got chatting and she posted on Facebook what he was doing. At the time Jeffrey had only raised a small percentage of his target. Paula's post was spotted by comedian Jason Manford who reposted it and encouraged people to contribute. Within minutes the target had been broken with £4500 raised and the total just kept on rising.



Jeffrey was travelling back to a hotel in Weybridge each night returning in the morning to continue his walk where he left off. That was until he met Patrick Riley in Maidenhead and got talking. When Patrick found out what Jeffrey was doing he insisted that Jeffrey stayed the night with him and his family. Patrick and his

partner Anne put Jeffrey up for two nights.

Thanks to the chance meeting and the involvement of Jason Manford Jeffrey has

substantially exceeded his target with the total at over £120,000 at the time of writing.

The following Sunday Jeffrey was a guest at Chelsea football club where he was presented with a personalised team shirt making it back to Bradford in time to attend our November social meeting.

IAM News Releases and Tips

Pedestrians in the dark – as the nights draw in



With summer well and truly over and the clocks now reverting to GMT, the nights will be well and truly drawing in. During the period of shorter daylight hours (October to March) we statistically see more incidents involving pedestrians and vulnerable road users than during other months. With the most incidents being between 3pm and 7pm we need to keep our eyes peeled for our vulnerable pedestrians in the dark. This week's tips for keeping pedestrians safe are from IAM RoadSmart's head of driving and riding standards, Richard Gladman.

Keep an eye on your speed, remember you are twice as likely to kill a pedestrian driving at 35 as you are if driving at 30mph. Be especially aware near schools, the only predictable thing about children is how unpredictable they can be. Remember 20 in these areas really is plenty.

Children can be harder to see and may run out between parked vehicles, remember to 'LOOK OUT' (over, under and through) vehicles, you might just spot someone before they step out.

Some pedestrians give a tell-tale sign of what they are about to do — look out for people who keep looking over their shoulder, they might be looking to cross the road. If you have a generous space in front of you and vehicles behind you they may well run across rather than wait for all the traffic to come past. You also need to watch for mobile phone 'zombies', if you see someone concentrating on their phone they are not concentrating on the traffic, be ready for them to just step out.

When passing stationary vehicles keep at least a door's width whenever possible, not just for the car door that might open into your path; also for someone or something coming out into your path from between the vehicles.

Be considerate where you park, parking too close to a junction can obstruct someone's view and make it harder to see, also be aware of not obstructing pavements and dropped kerbs.

When it's raining and blowing a gale pedestrians are more likely to dash about and road safety often falls lower on their list of priorities than trying to keep dry.

With the clocks just gone back it can take children on bikes a bit of time to get used to the fact they need lights and can often get caught out being out without lights — make sure your children are aware of the need for lights on their bikes.

Richard said: "In a perfect world pedestrians would all be on the pavement and would never have to cross a road, in a near perfect one a pedestrian on a road would be wearing flashing high viz and your car would be shouting about their presence — in our real world it is up to us to share the road space, be aware and help where we can. An effort to be courteous will go a long way to making someone's day and will help keep us all safe"

Voluntary assessments, F1RSTs, Masters and Fellows

Not all MYAM members realise that there are things that you can do to retain and improve their driving skills after passing the Advanced Driver Test.

For many years, the main way to continue your development as a driver was to become an Observer. If you want more information, David Rushfirth will be more than happy to hear from you. His details are on the last page of every newsletter. MYAM Observers all enjoy working with Associates because it helps them to think about their own driving.

MYAM members can also ask for an informal check drive with one of our Observers. The Sunday morning sessions (Page 3 in the newsletter) are not just for Associates, everyone is welcome.

If you want to make this more formal, you can take a voluntary assessment with an IAM Examiner. If this goes well, you may also be eligible to join the F1RST register, alongside other drivers who have shown a high level of skill during their test.

An entry in the IAM Masters Register places you alongside some of the best civilian drivers on our roads. The test is tough and you will need the support of a mentor with a similar qualification. If you are interested, please have an initial chat with David Rushfirth or David Stringer. The Masters qualification is valid for five years.

Both a voluntary assessment and the Masters test allow you to apply for Fellowship – an option that became available earlier this year. Being a Fellow commits you to taking another Advanced Driver test every three years and your annual IAM subscription is more expensive. However, there also some insurance and other benefits. Currently, there are three IAM Fellows who are also members of MYAM.

Lots more details about these routes for retaining your driving skills are given in the members area of the IAM website. It is important to remember that these are individual qualifications, but MYAM will provide support when it can.

Because the entry into the Masters and Fellowship registers are personal to you, MYAM is not told directly about your new status. Please let us know if you would like a name in the newsletter.

And Finally.....

A man from Charlotte, North Carolina, having purchased a case of very expensive cigars, insured them against, among other things, fire. Within a month, having smoked his entire stockpile, the man filed a claim against the insurance company, stating that the cigars were lost "in a series of small fires".

The insurance company refused to pay, citing the obvious reason that the man had consumed the cigars in the normal fashion. The man sued - and won.

In delivering the ruling the judge, agreeing that the claim was frivolous, stated nevertheless that the man held a policy from the company in which it had warranted that the cigars were insurable and also guaranteed that it would insure against fire, without defining what it considered to be "unacceptable fire", and was obliged to pay the claim. Rather than endure a lengthy and costly appeal process the insurance company accepted the ruling and paid the man \$15,000 for the rare cigars he lost in "the fires".

After he cashed the cheque, however, the company had him arrested on 24 counts of arson.

With his own insurance claim and testimony from the previous case being used against him, the man was convicted of intentionally burning his insured property and sentenced to 24 months in jail and a \$24,000 fine.
