A few years ago Peter Dole IAM examiner wrote this us and I thought it would be timely to include it again.

I have fitted snow Tyres for as long as I can remember now. Mainly because I have

always lived at the top of a hill and wouldn't have got out otherwise! They really do make a difference both in the snow and when the temperature drops below 7 degrees. The tread pattern is different and there are more blocks to grip in the snow and slush.

A warning though. There are a number of tyre places which sell winter Tyres which have been imported from the continent. These may seem a bargain but there is a reason they are exported from the likes of Germany. They have passed their best and are illegal over there! They have often had puncture repairs and are difficult to match. On the sidewall there is a series of four numbers which identify when they were manufactured. For example 0402 would mean they were made in the fourth week of 2002 making them 9 yrs old. The rubber has by this time lost it's flexibility and does not work as well.

At the moment Costco have an offer on Tyres if anyone has a card to get in. If you buy 4 Tyres you get 20% off. This includes snow tyres. You could get 2 Tyres of one size and 2 of another size for the deal so 2 people could share.

They are Michelin Tyres and are a little expensive but are one of the best and would last a few years. After all what price is safety and I can assure you that it will bring a smile to your face when you drive past a 4x4 which is stuck! It really makes a difference and if you have been stuck before you will wonder how you managed without.

Example of price when I last visited was for a 205/55 16 Michelin Alpin £100 before the 20% discount making them £80.

Hope this wasn't too boring but I like to share my experiences for the benefit of others.

IAMs Peter Roger becomes Honarary life member of AIRSO 21.1.16

The Institute of Advanced Motorists' (IAM) head of driving advice, Peter Rodger, has been presented with an Honorary Life Membership from the Association of Industrial Road Safety Officers (AIRSO).

AIRSO, a charity that has been dedicated to the delivery of road safety education and training for over 50 years, held the ceremony during its Annual General Meeting at The Oxford Hotel in Oxford on 20 January to present a number of awards to individuals who have contributed to road safety. Peter was recognised as only the 12th individual to become an Honorary Life Member in the last 25 years.

Peter was rewarded for his long-standing contribution to road safety during his time at the Metropolitan Police and at the IAM. His career in the police force spanned 30 years, where he served as an inspector in traffic patrol and driver and rider training for lorries, buses and motorcycles, as well as in training to fellow police officers involved in collision investigation and traffic laws.

Peter joined the IAM in 2005 as chief examiner and regularly spoke at conferences and in the media on road safety issues surrounding driving and riding.

Alongside being a member of the IAM, Peter is also a member of the Motor Schools Association.

On presenting the certificate the chair of AIRSO, Dr Lucy Rackliff, said: "We are proud to honour Peter Rodger with Honorary Life Membership. His contribution to road safety has played a key role in raising the standards of driving and riding for over 30 years. And his continuous efforts to making our roads safer must not go unnoticed."

AIRSO continues to play an influential role in reducing the number of road casualty incidents on busy and often congested roads by providing support to practitioners from the voluntary, statutory and private sectors.

Ken Keir, IAM's chairman, said: "We are delighted that Peter's ongoing commitment to improving road safety has been recognised by AIRSO. We would like to take the opportunity to congratulate Peter on becoming an Honorary Life Member of AIRSO – he truly deserves it."

Four of the five worst driving licence penalty point holders not banned 8.1.16

Three drivers with more than 40 points on their driving licences are still allowed on the road, according to a Freedom of Information request to the DVLA by the Institute of Advanced Motorists (IAM). The enquiry also found that 13 people in Britain currently have 28 or more points on their driving licence, the worst of those amassing 51 points.

In addition, the numbers of drivers with 12 or more points has gone up by 9% in just seven months between March and October 2015 – from 6,884 to 7,517 (reference 1).

While the DVLA does not hold details as to whether all of those individuals were still on the road, it did state that individual courts have the powers to choose not to disqualify a driver.

In its reply to the IAM's request, the DVLA said: "In a small percentage of cases where the driver has accumulated 12 or more penalty points, the agency understands that a court can exercise its discretion and not disqualify the driver.

"In the majority of these cases, magistrates may have decided to allow drivers to retain their entitlement to drive where it is considered that disqualification would cause exceptional hardship," it added.

The location of drivers with 28 points or more across Britain by postcode district is as follows:

Points/Location

51/Oxford, 42/Liverpool, 42/Basildon, 39/Wigan, 38/Burnley 33/Northampton,33/SW London, 30/Sheffield, 30/Southend-on-Sea 30/Slough, 30/Cambridge, 29/Peterborough, 28/Stevenage

Separately the IAM has looked into the 'top five' and has discovered the following:

• 51 points holder (Oxford): provisional licence holder, three speeding offences in 30mph zone, seven offences of not providing driver details. Not disqualified

- 42 points holder (Basildon): seven offences, all of which were for failing to report driver details. Previously held points for speeding including one at 109mph. Not disqualified from driving as magistrates accepted mitigating circumstances including 'extreme hardship' through loss of income. Not disqualified
- 42 points holder (Liverpool): currently seven counts on record, including two of speeding in 30mph areas and five of not reporting driver of vehicle. Not disqualified
- 39 points holder (Wigan): 13 counts of exceeding the speed limit for a goods vehicle. Not known if this driver has been disqualified
- 38 points holder (Burnley): 10 counts of speeding in 30mph areas. Not disqualified

DVLA data shows that of the 45 million driving licence holders in Britain, three million have points on their licence. Some 100,000 have been disqualified over the past four years for reaching 12 points and four per cent got all their points in one go (reference 2).

The DVLA also says their evidence suggests 90% of drivers not disqualified are due to 'judicial discretion' (reference 2).

Sarah Sillars, IAM chief executive officer, said: "The IAM has been highlighting this issue for several years now and we appreciate that the flow of information between the DVLA and the courts is slowly improving, which will allow the courts to make better decisions while armed with the full facts.

"However these improvements cannot come quickly enough to deliver a truly joined-up approach to the judicial process. Individual courts making decision on prosecutions can lead to inconsistency in how the law is applied which risks devaluing the simple '12 points and you're out' road safety message. If the public sees that persistent offenders are getting away with it, they may believe that road traffic rules – which let not us not forget, are designed for their safety – are ineffective or unimportant."

Don't be gone with the wind 6.1.15

This week's tips, from the IAM's director of standards, Mark Lewis are advising motorists on how to cope with driving in high winds. Keep up-to-date with our latest tips and ensure your winter drive is a smooth one.

- Plan your journey beforehand and check for any travel disruptions that may affect you. If you can, avoid driving through country roads which are more likely to be exposed to fallen branches and debris.
- Gusts of wind can unsettle vehicles grip your steering wheel firmly with both hands. This is particularly important when planning an overtake.
- Remember to give vulnerable road users including, cyclists, motorcyclists and pedestrians more room than usual. They are more likely to be blown around by side winds always keep a safe distance.
- As you approach a bend ensure you are able to stop on your own side of the road in the distance you can see to be clear you never know what's around the corner. If large debris is obstructing the road ahead, be prepared to make a U-turn and use another route.
- Keep an eye out for gaps between trees, buildings or bridges over a river or railway these are some of the places you are more likely to be exposed to side winds. Ensure that you maintain enough room either side of your vehicle so you can account for it being blown sideways.

Mark said: "Driving in windy conditions can be quite challenging, so it's important that you concentrate on the road at all times and take particular care when driving through narrow roads or over bridges. Also, keep an eye out for where you will suddenly go from a windy section of the road to a sheltered one – sudden loss of strong winds can be just as unbalancing, so be prepared."

You're as cold as ice 20.1.16

This week's tips from the IAM's director of standards, Mark Lewis, are about driving safely in frost and ice. With temperatures near freezing, here's how you can ensure your journey is a safe one for the road.

• Make sure you have cleared your windows and side mirrors before starting your journey and use the heater settings to remove mist and condensation. Avoid using hot water to pour over your windscreen as it's more than likely that it will freeze up again. Never apply heat to a door lock as most modern locks now have plastic components.

- Keep an eye on your tyres. The legal minimum tread depth should be at 1.6mm – but for safe travel you should not let the depth go below 3mm.
 Whatever you do, avoid travelling with worn tyres at all costs as this will increase the likelihood of your car skidding. If you can afford them, winter tyres do offer a real grip advantage.
- If you're driving a manual vehicle, avoid using high revs and set off gently in second gear. This will improve control and reduce the risk of wheel spin. If you're driving an automatic vehicle, select the 'winter' mode, (if there is one), which will automatically lock out first gear and reduce the risk of wheel spin if unsure, refer to your handbook for more advice.
- If your car loses grip you should take your foot off the accelerator and point the front wheels in the direction you want them to go. All steering and braking inputs must be as gentle as possible in icy conditions. Front-wheel-drive vehicles are generally better in icy conditions, but if your car is a rear-wheel-drive always take it extra slow and steady when changing direction.
- Increase the distance between you and the vehicle in front, especially in slippery conditions. The same applies for when you're approaching a junction or a sharp bend drive at a steady speed that allows you to stop well within the available distance.

Mark said: "Even when frost thaws, ice will stay around areas that are often shaded or near bridges that are exposed to wind-chill. Consider how you drive through these micro-climates and be prepared to slow down if you need to.

"If road conditions are too slippery, simply avoid starting your journey."
