Directions to the Manor Golf Club,

Bradford Road, Drighlington, Bradford, BD11 1AB

The carpark is well lit and for those who find walking difficult please park to the right hand side of the entrance where there is a ramp up to the doors.

Directions.

The Manor Golf Club is situated on the B6135, half a mile off the A650. If travelling from M62, M621 exit at Junction 27 onto the A650 to Bradford. At the second roundabout take the third exit onto the B6135, the entrance is on the left, immediately after the change in speed limit to 40.

From the A58 Leeds turn right at the traffic lights in Drighlington towards Bradford and the entrance is on the right immediately before the national speed limit sign.

From A58 Halifax turn left at the traffic lights in Drighlington towards Bradford and the entrance is on the right immediately before the national speed limit sign.

Tachometer breaks cause nearly 1,700 road closures in one year alone, IAM Drive & Survive finds 11.12.15

Tachometer breaks, the mandatory rest stops commercial operators must take when driving, were the cause of nearly 1,700 road closures in one year alone, according to newly released figures from IAM Drive & Survive.

According to the Road Haulage Association 85% of everything sold in the UK is carried by truck at some stage of the supply chain (reference 1) with this number set to increase as more retail purchases are made online in the run up to Christmas.

The numbers come from a Freedom of Information request to Highways England into why motorways and major A roads were closed in 2014. Tachometer breaks are one of the top 25 reasons for lane closures, with 1,669 incidents last year.

IAM Drive & Survive says one of the main causes of this problem is road infrastructure – insufficient numbers of laybys, a lack of services for commercial drivers and the impact of long distances of road works.

It adds that drivers and their employers can play their part in ensuring their journeys are as smooth and safe as possible and that planning journeys in advance is key.

Researching routes with good facilities for drivers, looking up road closures and avoiding areas where traffic delays are common all help to avoid the need to stop in unsuitable locations.

Lesley Upham, IAM commercial director, said: "Designing the roads and facilities drivers need to operate safely is essential, but meeting this objective needs a long-term approach.

"Until then employers and drivers must remain aware of the challenges and plan their journeys accordingly. Radio road traffic reports and live traffic functions on satellite navigation systems have a role to play, but planning ahead and having an alternative route in mind is also essential.

"There is also a great responsibility on employers to limit the time-based pressure put on their drivers. Nothing will delay their operations as much as a serious incident and if an accident occurs procedures will be scrutinised."

Other significant reasons for road closures include abnormal load (3,191) and vehicle shedding its load (6,648).

Seventy per cent of people support reduced drink-drive limit, IAM finds 16.12.15

Almost seventy per cent of people would like to see the legal drink-drive limit reduced across England, Wales and Northern Ireland (1), to the same level of that implemented in Scotland, according to a survey by the Institute of Advanced Motorists (IAM).

The legal alcohol limit in Scotland was reduced from 80 to 50 milligrams of alcohol in 100ml of blood in December 2014. At the beginning of this year, Police Scotland confirmed they saw a 19% reduction in drivers prosecuted for being under the influence of alcohol over the festive period, compared with the same period the previous year.

As well as supporting a reduction in the limit, many people are also keen that drink driving receives a festive focus. Nearly half of those surveyed answered that seasonal Christmas drink-drive campaigns should always be made a priority by the police. The success of this approach is demonstrated by existing research from the Department for Transport which shows that the number of people convicted of drink driving falls in December despite more people being tested over the festive period. The survey of 2,437 visitors to the IAM website, which took place during November 2015, also found that almost half would like the police to be given more power to stop any driver and request a random breath test.

As Scottish drink-drive numbers continue to fall, with a corresponding reduction in alcohol-related accidents (4), the IAM's chief executive officer, Sarah Sillars said: "While the police double their efforts in reducing the number of drink-drive incidents during this time of year, it's important that we look to a solution that can make a positive change over the long-term.

"Many of our survey participants would like to see stricter laws introduced, in order to discourage those who continue to risk one or two drinks when driving. The IAM welcomed the adoption of lower limits in Scotland last year and this change seems to be successfully reinforcing the message that we should all make it none for the road. Christmas is a time when people are more conscious of the risk of drink-driving and the IAM supports campaigns which makes the non-drinker the hero on a night out, so that everyone stays safe."

Yule be snow happy with the IAM's driving hints – no rein (deer) on our parade! 16.12.15

This week's tips from the IAM's director of standards, Mark Lewis, are looking at how you can safely drive around crowded shopping areas this Christmas. Keep upto-date with our latest advice to ensure your journey is as safe as possible.

- Keep an eye out for pedestrians who will be leaving Christmas parties and shopping centres in the dark. Remember, they may be distracted or drunk so make sure that your dipped headlights are switched on and that you are prepared to slow down if necessary.
- If you're the designated driver dropping friends back home, make a note of their address details before they have a drink or you may risk agreeing to take them home when they are not sober enough to tell you where they need to go!
- When driving with other people, make sure their behaviour doesn't distract you. Stay focussed on the road ahead and make sure all passengers have their seatbelts fastened.
- You are more likely to feel tired when travelling in the dark and for a long period of time. Make sure you are prepared for this by drinking some coffee or drinking plenty of water to stay hydrated and alert.
- The more people in your car, the quicker the windows will mist up. Make sure you understand how to demist your car internally to help dry out the air and keep visibility clear.

Mark said: "As the designated driver don't feel tempted to consume any alcohol – one drink can be too much. Enjoy the run up to Christmas, but make sure you make it a safe one for yourself, your passengers and all other road users. So long as you reflect these tips in your driving, you can make the festive season a merry one."

Don't let wet weather rain on your parade, says the IAM 27.12.15

With wet weather continuing to engulf the UK, the Institute of Advanced Motorists' (IAM) director of standards, Mark Lewis, looks at how drivers can best prepare for driving in heavy rain.



- 1. Before setting off, check for any weather alerts, traffic updates or planned road closures that may affect your journey. Only travel in extreme adverse weather conditions if it is really necessary.
- 2. Check lights and windscreen wiper blades are clean and working properly. Also check the tyre pressure and tread depth to ensure the best possible grip on wet surfaces.
- 3. Plan your route in advance and try to avoid any roads that are prone to flooding, even if it extends your journey.
- 4. Heavy rain often leads to damaged road surfaces and puddles can hide deep potholes look for clues such as loose chunks of tarmac.
- 5. In heavy rain, don't forget to switch on your dipped headlights so other motorists can see you easily. Reduce your speed when travelling in the rain to decrease your stopping distance. This will also help you pass through large puddles and potholes smoothly, without spraying other road users or risking aquaplaning.
- 6. Torrential rain may interfere with the electrics of a vehicle causing a breakdown. Prepare for the worst by keeping your mobile phone charged and with the number of your breakdown service provider already saved on it. While you wait for help keep your bonnet closed as soaking the engine will only make it worse.
