MEMBERSHIP SECRETARY REPORT TO ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING 9TH MAY 2016

It's been an interesting year in MYAM since our last AGM in May 2015 through to the end of April 2016.

Membership - At the beginning of May last year we had around 450 members following the integration of the last of our four groups — Harrogate - then dropped to around 375 within a short time as the group stabilised, and has dropped since, now standing at 338. These results are not unexpected, and reflect the churn which occurs as what is effectively a 'new' group settles.

During the year we've had 47 Associates who have joined the group, which has resulted in 36 test passes, 6 of which were Firsts, and with 2 fails. Now you may ask "why not 47 tests?" — which is one of the realities of group life, in that we always have Associates who train up and do not wish to go on to take the Advanced Driving test. That's fine; at least we and they feel they are better drivers than when they started. But we also have a growing number of people who sign up for Skill for Life and then resist all attempts to get in touch with them. Some of those Associates are unwilling participants, who have been given Skill for Life as a gift (perhaps as a not-so-subtle hint), and there are those put in for it by their employer. These eventually fall by the wayside in spite of efforts by the Observers. It's also one of those strange things that we sometimes get Associates joining in 'bunches', which puts further strain on our Observers.

Observers - And this leads nicely on to our band of Observers. We started the year with 32 Observers, and as with members, we've had some leave, and some join, and we now have 25, with 4 of those being trainees. Most of our Observers are now registered with the Institute of Motor Industries (IMI), while many have become qualified under that scheme. At any one time, however, we do operate with less than our maximum due to Observers not being available for whatever reasons. Associates are often amazed to be told that all our Observers are volunteers (for which read 'unpaid'), who give up masses of their time to help others become better drivers. During the year, our Observers have completed around 900 hours of training of all types between them all, each session being 1-2 hours in duration. That's a lot of work! This results in us having a current pass rate of 97%. During the year we also needed to take on the IAM's initiative of providing free 'Love Driving' taster sessions. These were very similar to our usual free assessments, and resulted in several new Associates joining us. All of this took place while MYAM was piloting the new test standards which are now being rolled out nationally.

The day-to-day performance of the group is tracked by the IAM in Chiswick on a monthly 'scorecard', which compares our group with the rest of the region. Some of the regional average figures sometimes raise our eyebrows, and lead us to wonder just what some other groups are doing, but MYAM consistently performs very well indeed on virtually every single

statistic. This is due to the superb standard of our Observers, who are to be commended for their efforts.

Group Subscriptions - The subscriptions ('subs') we receive are used for the day-to-day running of the group, and help with postage, stationery, printing, room bookings, guest speakers etc. etc. During the year, we changed from having all membership subs renewed at the same time, to 'rolling' renewals, based on each individual member's joining date. This is because it had become unwieldy to administer the old system, as there was a huge 'bulge' of renewals to sort out all in one go, and it was confusing for members, as well as the membership secretary and the treasurer. There is still some ongoing confusion however, in that some members do not always understand that group subs are totally different from subs to the IAM itself, and we take every opportunity to point out the difference. Having said that, once again the group subs have been held at the low price of £8 a year. This works out at about 66p a month — not bad value. Renewal reminders are sent out automatically in advance of expiry dates so as to prompt

members, but this does mean that they are also sent to those who have set up standing orders, which can cause an overlap between the renewal reminder and any standing order actually arriving in the MYAM account. This is perhaps one area which could be looked at to be somehow changed in future.

We also brought in the process of only sending two renewal reminders to each member a month apart, before we considered a member as having declined to renew, at which point (3 months after the first reminder) their records are 'archived' off. This is because more often than not it was taking a lot of time spent on phone calls, texts, and emails in chasing people up to remind them to renew. There is no pattern to these - very often members just simply choose to ignore the reminders on the assumption that we would know from their lack of response that they no longer wanted to remain a member of the group. But, as with all these things, this is kept under constant review. So in summary, the group's membership is in a reasonably good state of health, and can again look forward to another successful year.

From the A58 Leeds turn right at the traffic lights in Drighlington towards Bradford and the entrance is on the right immediately before the national speed limit sign.

From A58 Halifax turn left at the traffic lights in Drighlington towards Bradford and the entrance is on the right immediately before the national speed limit sign.

IAM News releases and tips

Safety Around Mobility Scooters

Staying mobile is incredibly important. Losing the ability to get around has a proven link to social isolation and depression. Mobility scooters offer a new freedom for many people.



They can however pose challenges for other road users. Understanding the challenges on both sides and sharing the road is the key. IAM RoadSmart's head of driving and riding standards, Richard Gladman, shares his advice on driving safely around mobility and electric wheelchair users.

- Be mindful of larger mobility scooters. They can only travel at 8 mph but may be using the road. Give them space and only overtake when it is safe to do so.
- Smaller mobility scooters are restricted to using footpaths and pavements. Dropped kerbs are the only way mobility and electric wheelchair users not to mention parents with prams can cross a road easily. It's also an offence to obstruct these crossing points. When parking consider whether you're inadvertently making it trickier for a less mobile person to get around.
- Mobility scooters aren't allowed to use cycle lanes or bus lanes so try not to get impatient if it seems they're blocking the road they're obeying the law.
- While larger scooters must have full lights, the smaller ones intended for pavement use don't need to. In addition, waterproof covers can affect the vision of the driver. Never assume you've been seen. And always double check before pulling out.
- You might be surprised to learn drivers in mobility scooters can technically use dual carriageways. Always expect the unexpected and be prepared for someone around the corner who may be travelling slower than you.

Richard said: "All road users have subtly different challenges and problems tend to arise when these challenges clash. But the groups aren't mutually exclusive. The driver of a mobility scooter probably used to own a car. The Mum with the buggy might drive a bus for a living.

Time is always too short but a bit of understanding of these conflicting needs goes a long way in making us more amicable road users. And a bit of empathy can make us feel better too. Who doesn't get a warm glow from a friendly thank-you wave from the driver you allowed to go first? Keep an eye out for your fellow road users and improve your own day as well as theirs."

Hiring a Vehicle Abroad

Planning a road trip for your next holiday abroad? Then be sure to read our latest tips from IAM RoadSmart's head of driving and riding standards, Richard Gladman, who will guide you through hiring a vehicle abroad.

- Take some time out to familiarise yourself with the rules and laws of the country you'll be travelling to. The European Commission's website has everything you need to know about differing regulations across continental Europe: http://bit.ly/1fUlidw.
- Don't forget to go online and get a 'check code' for your driving licence up to 72 hours before you travel: http://bit.ly/1Mes73Q. This is so you can give it to the hire car company if they ask for it. Codes are valid for 21 days, and can only be used once so if you will be making more than one hire, you need to get more than one code.
- Upon collection, give the car a thorough inspection. If you spot any signs of wear and tear, damage to the bodywork, windscreen or wheels inform the rental company. If you're still not 100% happy, don't be afraid to ask for another vehicle.
- Keep some handy telephone numbers with you particularly of a breakdown recovery service in case of an emergency. And should you inadvertently find yourself on the wrong side of the law, the Foreign Office has some useful information about what you should do: http://bit.ly/1giXBwX.
- Pack your sat nav and programme in your destination beforehand. But don't forget to switch off any speed camera information as it is illegal to use in many countries.

Richard said: "It's an easy one to overlook, when you're trying to fit your suitcases in the car and the kids need the loo. Again, always check the boot before you drive off. Some countries require a warning triangle by law. Others a high-vis jacket. Do your homework so you know what you need. And make sure you're given it.

Also, if you have a smartphone (or camera - Ed) take some pictures of all four sides of your hire car beforehand – this can be useful evidence if any damage claims arise. Have a read of the small print in the hire agreement so you know exactly what is covered, who can drive and what the excess will be. Most importantly, enjoy the drive – happy travelling!"

Coping with Hay Fever

A runny nose, headache and constant sneezing – these are just a few of the symptoms hay fever sufferers deal with during the summer. These symptoms can affect motorists in a number of ways. Here's some advice from IAM RoadSmart's head of driving and riding standards, Richard Gladman, about what you can do to better cope with it before taking to the road.

- Try to minimise the effects by ensuring your car is clean and dust free and that you operate the air conditioning or ventilation to your advantage, making use of air recirculation where possible.
- For anyone who hasn't been diagnosed with hay fever and is feeling under the weather, avoid driving or riding and arrange to see your GP as soon as possible. What you might think is just a slight cold can become a major distraction so get it checked before it gets worse.
- While over-the-counter medicines will help with a runny nose and sneezing symptoms, a lot of these tend to contain codeine, which can blur vision and make you feel drowsy check with your GP what the best course of action is.
- Your GP may advise you to take anti-histamines to control the symptoms, but make sure you take the non-drowsy ones. If you're unsure, read the leaflet or speak to your pharmacy for more advice.
- If you need to get somewhere but don't feel well enough to drive or ride then see if someone you know can take you and drop you back. Whatever you do don't take yourself you may just end up sneezing and travelling up to 50ft with your eyes closed and losing control of your vehicle!

Richard said: "If you are stopped by the police after taking a hayfever remedy and driving whilst impaired you could find yourself falling foul of drug driving regulations.

Be sure to check the medication thoroughly and see if it is suitable. But most importantly, concentrate on your route to recovery so you can get back onto the road sooner rather than later."
