Dead or Dead Slow?: New statistics reveal threat on



Britain's roads for horse riders

Over 60% of incidents involving horses on the roads happen between 10am and 3pm, with accidents most commonly occurring in June, new statistics from The British Horse Society (BHS) reveal**.

(In this poster you can quite clearly see the horse and rider lying dead in the carriageway.

In the five years since the launch of its horse accidents website, over **2,000*** reports of road incidents involving horses have been reported to the charity. Of these, **36** caused rider deaths, and **181** resulted in a horse dying from their injuries or being put to sleep.

75% of accidents happened because the vehicle passed the horse without allowing enough space, while **over a quarter** of respondents said that they also had to deal with driver road rage during the incident.

The majority of these incidents happened on a minor road and in a rural area. **Nearly half** of the horses involved were used to riding on the roads more than once a week.

The launch of the campaign, **Dead Slow**, follows a number of high profile petitions calling for greater protection for horse and rider on the roads following the injury of horse carriage master, Mark Evans and the death of his horse Wil, who was hit by a car in Wales last month as he pulled a funeral cortege.

Lee Hackett, BHS Director of Policy, said: "We are asking drivers to slow down to 15mph when they see a horse on the road. A lot of people aren't sure how to

safely pass a horse when driving, and so we have produced a video showing exactly how it should be done.

It's worth remembering that these statistics are just the accidents reported to us, there will be countless others. Almost everyone who rides horses can recount a story about a time they had a near miss on the roads.

We are campaigning for legislative change, but that can take a long time. That is why we are asking for this instant change in behavior from drivers."

TOP TIPS from your Editor

As some of you will know I have been a horse owner/rider for 25 years and I have had some harrowing experiences on the roads, so here are a few pointers to help you when you need to overtake horses.



- 1. When you see a horse, immediately slow down, wait patiently, making sure you can see tarmac and hooves, wait until the road is clear before you overtake.
- 2. Be patient. DON'T sound your horn or rev the engine. Be respectful. At times horses will be 2 a breast. This is probably because it's a young or inexperienced horse or rider on the inside
- 3. Pass wide and slow, maximum 15miles per hour, giving AT LEAST a car's width gap.
- 4. Accelerate away slowly.

Remember riders can often see or hear things you can't.

WHAT TO LOOK OUT FOR, ASK "WHERE IS ITS HEAD????????"

If the horse has a long neck and looks to be calm then use the tips above to pass. However if the horse is 'jogging, head up and neck shortened, BEWARE.

An experienced rider should turn the horse's head towards the carriageway and you, this helps two fold; one the horse will jog away from you and its rear legs will be forced towards the curb. DO NOT OVERTAKE if the head of the horse is towards the hedgerow, as its rear legs can and will, if it feels threatened, kick out at you, into the carriageway. Trust me their legs can go a heck of a lot further than you would think. If you come across this situation, note that this could be a combination of novice horse and rider so back off.

At the end of the day we are talking about you being delayed by seconds. Riders do not choose to go on the carriageway but in order to access the ever decreasing bridleways this invariably necessitates a ride on our roads. Riders unfortunately cannot apply a hand brake and the partnership relies solely on trust. Riders usually will not use the grass verges as there are hidden dangers that can cause serious harm to their beloved mounts e.g. broken bottles, cans, plastic bags, not to forget rabbit and mole hills and this land is owned by someone so permission would be required first.



Remember it's not just the horse and rider that will suffer following an impact it will cause significant impact to your vehicle and those in it

Protect your car, Protect horse and riders.

CHILD CAR SEAT SAFETY 6.4.16

This week's tips are all about fitted car restraints and ensuring your child has a safe and comfortable car journey. If your child is 12 years old or younger they must be in an appropriate car seat. The IAM's Communications Manager, Caroline Holmes, has some advice on ensuring you choose the right one for your child.

1. Firstly, the seat must suit your child but also be compatible with your car. ISOFIX is the international standard for attachment and most modern vehicles have compatible mounts. If you already have a car seat and it moves around, it's probably not secured correctly. Contact the manufacturer for advice and if you have any doubts replace it.

- 2. There are legal conditions around the type of child seats you can use based on the age and height of your child. If you're unsure, seek professional advice from a child seat provider. You can also find out more via http://www.goodeggcarsafety.com/.
- 3. Check the condition and attachment of the seat on a regular basis as they do suffer from wear and tear. Take a look at the manufacturers tag to check the expiration date.
- 4. Always install the restraint on the back seat of your car where possible. If the front is the only option, take the car to a garage to ensure the front passenger airbag controls are disabled.
- 5. Small children are more at risk of spinal cord injuries in a front facing seat, so make sure you place them in a rear facing one for as long as necessary.

Caroline said: "Toddlers in particular are very prone to wriggling their arms out of the harness. Double-check the harness is the correct height and pulled comfortably around your child. If your child is uncomfortable, check the harness isn't too tight by putting two flat fingers between your child's collar-bone and the harness.

"Unfortunately some tough love might be needed here. Lots of children aren't keen on being strapped in, but it really is essential to ensure a safe and secure journey for the whole family."

IAM president Mansell takes Auto Express back to (driving School) 13.4.16

Former world Formula 1 champion Nigel Mansell and the Institute of Advanced Motorists (IAM) teamed up with Britain's biggest motoring magazine Auto Express to take one of its reporters back to school with a set of driving challenges.

The test, which will be featured in the magazine and online from today (13 April) saw Nigel and the IAM find out if an F1 champion could teach safer driving and advanced techniques to a regular motorist.

Auto Express news editor Richard Ingram had the daunting task of being tested by the 1992 world champion, who is also IAM President. Nigel was backed up by the IAM's head of driving standards Richard Gladman.

Nigel said: "I made a living through driving on race circuits at often very high speeds – but being a winner is not just about being fast. Precision, control and knowing where to use speed were the most important aspects of being successful.

"The same applies to every road user. You can be a top class driver, enjoy a journey of any length and get real satisfaction from every mile. Advanced techniques, like those offered by the IAM, can help you become as good as me. Well, almost!

"And Richard Ingram did a great job under the pressure of having me as his examiner."

Richard Ingram was taught how to slalom around cones, safer emergency braking, reversing into a parking space and cornering by Nigel and Richard Gladman.

Richard Gladman said: "We wanted to show that it's possible to demonstrate skill and talent behind the wheel without the need for speed. Nigel's insight proved that everyone can be a champion of the road – while driving more efficiently, more confidently and having fun."

Richard Ingram added: "The thought of having Nigel Mansell as my driving examiner felt just a little intimidating at first. But it was clear straight away how advanced driving made me a more thoughtful driver, and as a result could reduce stress on increasingly busy roads."

MOTORISTS WANT 'THE RIGHT TO DRIVE' 28.4.16

- Driverless cars are coming.
- Humans and machines together deliver safety.
- 65 per cent of motorists believe the driver should remain in control.
- Will driving only be for pleasure in the future?
- Are driver-designated roads the future for motorists?

More than 65 per cent of motorists want to retain the right to drive even though driverless cars are coming, two new pieces of research released today have shown (April 28th 2016).

IAM RoadSmart – formerly the Institute of Advanced Motorists – conducted an independent survey of 1,000 British motorists and a separate poll among its 92,000 members.

This month's tips from the IAM

Is your car Spring ready

Spring has officially arrived and like us, our cars need to shake off the winter cold to be fit for the summer ahead. If you haven't done so already, get your car ready for spring with our latest tips from the IAM's standards and compliance manager, Richard Gladman.



- If you haven't given your car a full spring clean yet now is a good time to wash off all the grime and road salt. Use a pressure washer to clean the underside, but take care with delicate areas and don't spray directly onto oil seals or rubber areas. Better still, let a professional clean it.
- Give your windows a good clean on the inside too dirty windows are more prone to misting up. Simply use washing up liquid in water to get them squeaky clean.
- If you've been using winter tyres replace them with summer tyres.
 Check the tyres thoroughly for damage and check the pressures before setting off.
- Ensure your wiper blades are in full working order after a winter of hard use and test all of your lights.
- Spring may well bring on hay fever so use the air conditioning and recirculation settings on your ventilation system to help reduce the effects.

Richard said: "It's easy to overlook when the temperatures aren't in the high twenties, but make sure you keep a pair of sunglasses with you too – the sun tends to be very low at this time of year and these will come in handy when dealing with glare in the early morning and evening.

"In this light dirt and grime on the windscreen and mirrors can be even more distracting— keep them clean throughout."



Ne'er cast a clout till May be out -

On the face of it this means don't leave off your winter coat until the month of May is ended' but what it really means is not until the Hawthorn or "May Tree" is in blossom, usually early to mid-May.
