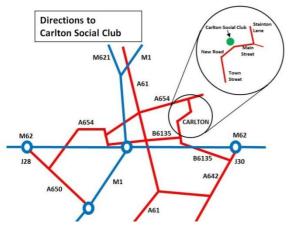

From the M62 West leave at Junction 28 and take the A650 towards Wakefield. At the next set of traffic lights turn left onto the A654 toward Rothwell. Follow the A654, turning left in Thorpe on the Hill. Cross the A61 and continue into Carlton. Turn right into Stainton Lane then turn right into Main Street. The Social Club is on the right immediately after the Unicorn pub.

From the M62 East leave at junction 30 and take the A642 towards Wakefield.

Take the next right, B6135, towards Lofthouse. Follow the B6135 under the M62 onto Ouzlewell Green towards Carlton and Rothwell. Follow the road past Carlton Primary School and the Social Club is on the left just before the Unicorn pub.

There is a car park with overspill parking available on the grass area opposite the club.

April Meeting - Ratby 2000

Our very own Editor Keith, kindly stepped in at the last minute to tell us about a millennium photographic project he was involved with when he lived in Ratby in Leicestershire.

The project about the village took a few years to put together by the small committee and gave an interesting insight as to how a place evolves and came about with the idea of presenting a

brief history (1900-2000) and possibly publishing a book in the future to celebrate the millennium.

Around 1900 the small, mainly agricultural, village had around 331 homes, by 2000 there were 1600. Keith showed us maps showing the development of the village, with much farmland being sold for housing and which continues to be developed today. Being close to Leicester and with the M1 running very close by it's easy to see why.



For the project Keith had sourced many old photos of village life and compared them to modern day (the millennium) which he showed a selection to us. The longest serving headmistress (1925 to 1957) of the primary school was a keen photographer whose work was a great resource.

Luckily the three public houses, two churches and the primary school were still going strong along with a smattering of local stores.

The railway opened up in Ratby in 1832 with a station built in 1876, prior to this, tickets had been sold at the nearby Railway Inn, sadly the Beeching cuts took its toll in 1966.

The cinema, plastics factory, farms and local bus company are now all lost but the village has managed to maintain its bi-yearly Crow Pie Carnival a typical English village fete and its popular Ratby Co-Operative Brass Band.

By early 2003 a book and a CD ROM were produced for the village, the CDs sold out at the event launch which meant sufficient funding was obtained for 8 trees to be planted in the village.

The growth and change of Ratby will be typical of villages up and down the country, around the millennium there weren't the same digital research sources as we have today so easily to hand i.e. Google (other search engines are available!) cameras, mobiles, many hours will have been spent in the library etc. collating information which should be applauded – thanks Keith!

Not The Millennium Bug

Do you remember the Millennium Bug which was supposed to bring the world to a halt on 1st January 2000 because Microsoft software only stored the year not the century to save memory. In the end it was a bit of a damp squib with very few problems occurring. Recently there has been another similar, not so well publicised, issue with the GPS system.

The GPS system is basically a set of highly accurate clocks in orbit around the earth. They transmit time data to your satnav which uses the timings from three or more satellites to calculate your position on the earth. However the time data is limited to 1024 weeks meaning roughly every 19 years the time resets to zero. This can confuse some satnav systems, especially early ones. More modern satnavs have been, or should have been, programmed to cope with the reset.

So if you have an old satnav that is playing up it may be due to this issue. Check with the manufacturers website to see if you may be able to update it but some systems are now classed as "obsolete" and may not updateable.

The Technology in Your Car – 3 Fuel Injection

A car engine requires both fuel and air to function. These have to be in a specific ratio for the engine to run properly and for decades mixing the air and fuel was accomplished in a petrol engine by a carburettor. This relied on the air being drawn into the engine to draw the appropriate amount of petrol vapour through one or more jets. This was only ever an approximation to the correct fuel air ratio but gave satisfactory performance for decades. In the 1970s emission regulations started to appear meaning carburettors became more complex in order to meet the regulations.

As an alternative to a carburettor some cars, mainly more expensive models, used a fuel injection system where the amount of air being drawn into the engine was used to control the amount of fuel injected into the inlet manifold adjacent to the inlet valves. This could give better control over the fuel air mixture which led to an improvement in fuel consumption and an increase in engine power. The Triumph TR6 and 2.5Pl, introduced in the late 1960s, were examples of cars which used a mechanical system developed by Lucas which could be a little temperamental at times. Later Bosch introduced the K Jetronic system which was used on many cars in the 1970s and 80s. The Ford XR3i being one car fitted with the system. Its 1600cc engine produced 105bhp compared to the 96bhp produced by the original XR3 which had the same engine but fitted with a carburettor.

In the early 1990s stricter emission control requirements were introduced which meant fitting catalytic converters to cars to reduce the amount of unburnt hydrocarbons (i.e. fuel) in the exhaust. These required tight control of the fuel air mixture to work correctly. Although attempts were made to fit better control systems to carburettors most car manufacturers fitted a fuel injection system to their cars. Because of the requirements the earlier systems, which used a mechanical system to control the fuel air mixture, were replaced by electronic systems. These could control the mixture more precisely and take more factors into account. Modern systems meter the fuel and also control the ignition timing based on parameters such as air temperature, engine temperature, altitude, engine speed and fuel quality. As they also control the fuel injected very precisely at engine start up it means the elimination of the choke on older cars.

The precise control of the fuel and ignition means lower emissions, better fuel consumption and in many cases a higher power output. This has the benefit that for a given power a smaller, lighter engine can be used. The Triumph TR6 mentioned earlier used a 6 cylinder 2.5 litre which could produce 150bhp, but in practice was limited to 125bhp. My car has a 1.4 litre engine but is also rated at 150bhp. Most modern cars have engines with around 100bhp compared to around 60 to 70bhp for an equivalent car from the 1970s. The modern car will also have a better fuel consumption and lower emissions than the 1970s car.

The Disney Dilemma

It seemed a good idea at the time; a road trip to Disneyland Paris, and why not offer to take the 12-year-old nephew with me? A boys' road trip, what could be more fun!





I booked everything in good time – hotel just a 10minute monorail from the park, ferry tickets from Dover to Calais and a sat-nav that would (apparently) take me all the way to Disneyland.

Easy? Well not quite!

Researching the requirements of driving in France found that the authorities insist on much more equipment to

be carried in the car then we do. For a start you must have a red warning triangle, first-aid kit, spare bulb kit and an NF approved breathalyser kit to be carried in the car at all times. And of course a GB sticker on your car's rump.

Having collected all the various things I thought I needed from a well-known motoring spares store, the very knowledgeable sales assistant said I should put them all back, as they have a ready-made kit for European driving that is cheaper than the individual items! But the spare bulbs and the breathalyser kit (the kit must contain two breathalysers) needed to be bought separately. Also in the kit was a reflective yellow tabard and headlight deflectors ... and don't forget you need a tabard for each occupant of the vehicle, and the tabard needs to be easily reached by all those occupants.

It makes you wonder why in the UK we are not required to carry such items? Very often UK motorists do not carry any items of emergency equipment, nor does the law make us do so. A first-aid kit should be a no-brainer, a reflective tabard too if you happen to break down after dark or in poor weather.

So far so good. But with the confusion around Brexit what did I need around driving permits and the like? With the situation and the way it's reported changing by the day, and my trip starting mid-April I decided I would obtain everything I could get my hands on, even if it turned out I didn't actually need it in the end.

My car insurer wrote to me twice to say in the event of a no-deal Brexit I would need a Green Card – which they would provide free of charge. But don't leave obtaining one until the last minute, as it takes 3-5 working days to arrive, and my insurer asked for 14 days' notice.

There may also be the requirement to obtain an International Driving Permit – and there are different types depending on where you are going. This can be obtained from your local Post Office for £5.50; don't forget to take one passport-size photo and a photo ID too.

You should also take your car insurance documents with you, as well as your car's V5 form (commonly known as the logbook).

If all of this sounds confusing, well it is. With the terms of the UK's exit from the EU yet to be finalised, the official government website itself says: "Some of these requirements may change depending on the terms that the UK leaves the EU" and travellers need to keep checking for the latest information.

The best place to look is here: www.gov.uk

Other useful tips I found is that using a headset device for any reason whilst driving is now illegal, as is the use of a sat-nav system that detects speed cameras. If your sat-nav has such a system, you would be advised to switch off the 'points of interest' feature so you don't fall foul of the rules.

And if you wear glasses, you must keep a spare pair in the glovebox.

So the best advice is to keep checking all well-known travel websites as well as the government one, and don't leave anything to the last minute.

Now all I need to know is how to manage a moody/hyper (delete as applicable!) 12-year-old in the car on the way to Disneyland ... not sure if there is a set of tips for that one!

Illegal speed signs go up too early in Lincolnshire – get spray painted over



Speed limit signs in Grimsby have been painted over after impatient council workers put them up too soon.

The new signs, which impose a 20mph restriction on residential roads, were put up last week following the local authority's decision to lower the speed limit.

But locals in the North Lincolnshire town were angered after the signs appeared before the

council's public consultation on the changes had even concluded.

The consultation, seeking residents' and business owners' views on the changes, is due to run until April 17, meaning workers had to hurriedly paint over the erected signs.

More than 50 speed limit signs put up too early have now been defaced with paint, while council workers also had to remove parking bays that had been prematurely marked out.

Local authorities have not yet set a date for the new speed limit to be enforced, as this will depend on the outcome of the consultation period and any objections received.

With local elections on May 2nd, it's likely councillors will have to wait a couple of weeks before starting to assess any objections and deciding whether to go ahead with the scheme.

Speaking to Grimsby Live, a local takeaway owner called the signs "a complete waste of money."

"I watched them putting up the signs. Then they paint the signs while we were open. We just do not know what is going on and it doesn't look like the council know either.

"We have concerns about the bins outside not being emptied often enough, which doesn't look good outside and takeaway. But no one at the council seems to bother about that."

A spokesman for North East Lincolnshire Council said: "Residents and visitors are able to still park on street, in accordance with the waiting restrictions present.

"Speed cameras were considered, however they would not be suitable at this location."
