TOP AWARDS AT NATIONAL CONFERENCE

Lincoln leads the way

Two Lincoln Group officials received top awards at the IAM RoadSmart National Conference in Birmingham at the end of October.

Roger Hicks, Chief Observer, was awarded the prestigious Fred Welch Rose Bowl which was presented to him by IAM RoadSmart CEO, Sarah Sillars.

This trophy was presented to the IAM by the late Fred Welch in 1969. It is awarded annually to the car group member who, in the opinion of a panel of judges and the agreement of the CEO, has in the past and is currently contributing most to promoting the aims and objectives of IAM RoadSmart both at group and national level. This is not the first time the award has been presented to a Lincoln Group member; 25 years ago it was awarded to Glenys Allerton.



Interestingly, in the past four years it has been won three times by someone called Roger - is there a message here somewhere!!

As a result of winning this award, Roger has been invited to attend the Prince Michael International Road Safety Awards presentation and lunch at the Savoy Hotel in London in December.

Another top award was given to Ashley Behan, Group Secretary. Ashley was awarded a Star Performer award for the individuals who



in the opinion of the panel of judges is recognised as having worked tirelessly and contributed most to the successful running of their group. The award was again presented to Ashley by Sarah Sillars.

In addition to his onerous role as Group Secretary, Ashley also edits and produces this newsletter, identifies and organises our speakers and runs our social media communications; and at the same time makes a major contribution as a National Observer! If anyone deserved his efforts to be recognised with this award it is Ashley.

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DRIVING THROUGH WINTER

Advice from IAM RoadSmart's Richard Gladman

The Indian summer was fun while it lasted but make way for the hats, scarves and wellies because winter is on its way. The temperature is gradually dropping reminding us that we have to make sure we have our de-icers ready. Here are some tips to prepare motor users for the winter from IAM RoadSmart's head of driving and riding standards Richard Gladman.

- Set up a pre-winter check list. List things that need to be checked such as the car battery, bulbs, wiper blades and electrics. You don't want to be stranded in a cold car in the middle of night waiting for the recovery team to get you up and running again
- Dress appropriately for the weather. It may be surprising but too many drivers dress based on a working car heater. If it breaks or you are stranded you can easily be caught cold



- No bobble heads. Keep the windscreen clear. Try to get scratches, abrasions and chips fixed as colder temperatures can worsen the damage. Keep the windscreen washer topped up with a more concentrated screen wash mix to ensure it doesn't freeze in action. Lastly, search in the garage for last year's de-icing spray or better still invest in a new one
- Check your tyres. 1.6mm may be the legal limit but anything under 3mm will see a potential fall off in grip and braking performance. If long-term cold weather is forecast, and you can afford it, invest in a set of winter tyres approved by your car manufacturer. Don't follow urban driver myths of reducing the tyre pressure to get more grip — it simply doesn't work
- Start to plan for the really bad weather with a survival kit in the boot. Spare clothes, a torch, mobile phone charger, some emergency rations such as water and chocolate and a tow rope and shovel to help yourself and others.

Richard said: "winter is unpredictable but highway authorities are already planning for it by building up their salt stocks and getting the snow clearing equipment out of storage. If they are getting ready then why shouldn't you? With a little bit of preparation you can avoid getting stuck and adding to the problems that bad weather can bring"

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FORDIE'S WORLD

If anyone else gets the chance, TAKE IT...

This is the story of one man's struggle to renew a driving licence - MINE! I'll start at the beginning, which is natural.

In April, I had an eye operation on my right eye to relieve internal pressure, this was going to take some weeks to stabilise, so I had to delay my annual eye test until early June but because I want a section D1 on my licence to drive a mini-bus, I have to have a medical including an eye test. With me so far? As I said, the eye test was done early June but I had to wait nearly two weeks for the main medical. That done, the application was posted off straight away, then you sit and wait - and wait and wait some more. A number of frantic phone calls to DVLA finally elicited the fact that I needed one more eye test but they would "graciously" (my sarcasm) send me a letter permitting me to drive my car and motorbike whilst awaiting the outcome of the last test, if that was satisfactory they would finally renew my full licence.

I feel I have jumped through so many hoops I could perform as part of a canine troop in a circus. If there is a lesson to be learnt from the foregoing, it is to make sure you're 100% fit when you apply and maybe being under 70 helps! On a brighter note, I got the motor bike MOT'd and taxed at the end of July. What amazed me was that I had only done 169 miles between MOTs - I MUST GET OUT MORE!

Now the next little "trauma", in early August, I thought I saw some damp on the ceiling of the back-bedroom AKA the office, so up into the loft for investigation. The leak was from the central heating header-tank, just about the most inaccessible spot in the loft, peeling back the insulation to see where it was, the pipe broke! Water gushing everywhere, a quick shuffle back to turn off the tap and investigate further. Fortunately, Liz was quick with the laundry bucket so the water damage was not severe and 24 hours with touch and my fellow team members were the fan heater dried the carpet and floor. It was the inlet pipe to the ball-cock that had fractured so the repair was fairly straightforward, but I shall have probably grovelled about up there again by the time you read this to make any final adjustments and see that the insulation is properly in place. Who said retirement is relaxing!

So now I come to Thursday 11th August and the driving experience with LRSP on Scampton Airfield. Once on the premises, cars were parked, greetings made and a welcome coffee/tea was taken. After a short video, we split into four teams of three, our team went first to the simulator for some laps of Brands Hatch in a "High Powered Saloon". Each of us, on our first lap managed to pile it into the barriers, wander around all over the track, in and out of the gravel traps and still not get into top gear. Once we settled down, the driving became more "refined", one of the team members calling out the braking points, corners etc. If we had had a full half hour each, solid, we could have put in some good lap times but it wasn't easy and I marvel even more at the skill and fitness of real racing drivers.

The second test was blindfold driving, in and out of cones and a reverse back into a 'garage" with your passenger instructing. We all got better at it until the instructor said we couldn't use left or right command, we tried "to me" "to you" and then "port or "starboard", that's when the drive began to fall apart, apparently, at one point I went "grass-tracking", cones were skittled willy-nilly until we all finished up about helpless with laughter.

After lunch we did the trailer reversing test, seeing the antics of some of the other competitors, I began to wonder if my skill at reversing "artics" would fail me. The outfit was a van coupled to a low, tandem axle trailer so mirrors HAD to be used. For my part all was well, I still had the old

equally as good, so much so that our instructor decided he couldn't beat us so we better have another coffee whilst waiting to do the skid test!

Now this is a real eye-opener, it's not done on a wet or greasy track but in a car whoe suspension, braking and steering can be altered at will by the instructor. Again, we took it in turns, and sat in the back, though well strapped in, you really get thrown about, it was bad enough at 25/30 mph, heaven knows what it would be like in a genuine loss of control at twice that speed on a busy road but I wouldn't give too much for your chances. The day finished off with a motoring related guiz in which we all took part, scores were allocated to each team, but that was academic. It was an excellent experience, and just when you thought you knew it all, this day proved me very wrong but I feel I have learnt from it. My thanks to Ash for setting it all up and if anyone else gets the chance, TAKE IT - you'll love it!

Earlier that same week I went with a private party on a roof tour of our Cathedral, jokingly called the "Heineken Tour" because we went were the public don't go. It is a whole new world up there: rooms passages, nooks and crannies and when you get out on the roof, the views over Lincoln are magnificent. Stay safe, "them others" are still at large!





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
KNOW YOUR STUFF

Brake before the bend, not on it!

Department for Transport road safety organisation THINK! has relaunched it's 'County Roads' campaign.

59% of all fatalities occur on country roads. These roads often have sharp bends and blind bends which can hide unexpected hazards. Stay in control and give yourself time to react because you never know what's around the corner. THINK! Brake before the bend, not on it.

Look out for further discounts in this region on the approach to Christmas!

The best drivers read the road ahead and anticipate potential hazards. Look out for upcoming bends, hidden dips, blind summits and concealed entrances.

- Country roads often have sharp bends. To stay in control and give yourself time to react to unexpected hazards, brake before the bend, not in it.
- Overgrown verges, bushes and trees on country roads can block your view and potentially obscure an oncoming hazard. Always drive at a speed which will allow you to stop in the distance you can see to be clear (double that on a single track road). Allow more time to stop on wet or slippy surfaces.
- The speed limit is a limit not a target. The national speed limit on single carriage roads is 60mph, but there will be times you need to drive under that in order to drive correctly for the conditions. In fact most people do on these roads the average free flow speed is 48mph.
- If you get stuck behind a slow moving vehicle be patient. Dips in roads, bends and other junctions joining your road often hide oncoming vehicles, so unless it's absolutely essential, don't overtake.
- If passing more vulnerable road users such as horse riders, cyclists and walkers, pass wide and slow.
- Even if you're familiar with a country road, never take it for granted as the conditions can be different every time.


