
## We value your contribution

#### **CEO VISITS LINCOLN**

#### Sarah's vision

It was to a large group of members from Lincoln, Lincolnshire Bikes and Boston that Sarah Sillars CEO presented her thoughts and outline strategies for the next 60 years. Sarah, pictured with

IAM Lincoln Chief Observer, Roger Hicks, has a wealth of experience in the motor industry gained during her career so far, Sarah spoke about the rapid pace of change and Advanced Dri the need for the IAM to remain current and committed to improving competence & capability by encouraging drivers both young and old to take more interest in their driving.

With an ageing membership, the average age being 56 years, it is recognised there needs to be an increase in the numbers of younger drivers joining. However, unlike many organisations which are suffering from declining numbers, the IAM has to be congratulated because it is 'flying in the face of the tide' as numbers of new members are continuing to rise each year.

#### Strategic goals for the future

One of the most import ant goals is

our sustainability and there are a number of ways to help to ensure the organisation is successful over the next 60 years, including raising awareness that we are a trusted household brand. Sarah described how she believes we can sell the wide and various expertise within IAM RoadSmart, possibly using formats like a Helpdesk or an Advice Line. Sarah believes that the IAM can become the 'Go To' organisation for the Government and other centres; while reducing costs and improving efficiency the organisation can becoming more lean.

#### Market Research

Sarah spoke about the results of market research of 7000 people, including 1000 members of MumsNet with an average of 36 years which has shown some interesting aspects about attitudes to driving. This included the fact that 23% of younger people are not intending learning to drive or that they have no

intention of owning a car even if they can drive; preferring if necessary to hire one, or they would join a convenience scheme and rent one for short periods. The main concern that people

had was for other drivers competence while not appreciating in fact that they themselves are actually those 'other people'!

In a survey of non-members the results showed that:

- (a) the majority would like to receive information online about how they could improve their drivina
- (b) 66% would want the information to cost no more than
- (c) 71% would want it to take no longer than 2hrs to work through (d) they would only be only available in the evening between Monday & Thursday.



Having mentioned the new branding and the consolidation of the various divisions into one

thereby avoiding confusion, Sarah spoke about the emphasis on Advanced Driving & Riding. How the new routes into membership with the option of an assessment rather than just the current test may encourage some potential members who may otherwise have been put off by the thought of 'the test'.

Other considerations for the future are more of the taster type drives for specific driving conditions & the possibility of the introduction of a modular type scheme are also to be investigated and assessed. The move away from red to the new blue colour scheme is seen as more friendly according to market research and a positive step for the future.

Sarah recognised the great contribution that the volunteers make and she mentioned the high standard that needed to be achieved and maintained not just with the quality of observers, but in every area including the venues for IAM meetings which should be inviting, appealing & fit for purpose.



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## CHIEF OBSERVER'S UPDATE

## Helping to improve road safety on our roads

I'm very pleased to report that we have had an excellent first half of 2016.

Whilst last year we had 27 passes in all in the first half of this

year we have achieved 18 passes, seven of which were F1RSTs! The outlook for the second half of the year is looking even better. We already have one more pass and we currently have 25 associates in training, six of which are 'test ready' and awaiting test dates.

We should, therefore, comfortably exceed last year's results, our 2016 target whilst at the same time beating all the IAM's Key Performance Measures.

We are now fully trained and ready to implement the long awaited new standards and training system. This new system provides us with a structured method of training using professional materials and training aids which can only help both the associate and the observer. Additionally all groups are now using the same system so courses will be delivered uniformly throughout the UK and even

more importantly all examiners are now examining uniformly in line with the course content. Under this new system all groups have to meet certain performance standards in order to be able to deliver IAM RoadSmart advanced driving courses and I am pleased to report that Lincoln group is recognised as an Official Provider

In summary the IAM have made major progress with the launch of IAM RoadSmart and the new training systems, Lincoln group continues to prosper and as a result achieve our objective of helping to improve safety on our roads.

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#### LRSP DAY HIT WITH MEMBERS

Blind folded driving?



Thanks to a reignited collaboration between Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership (LRSP) and Lincoln & Boston IAM groups, we were pleased to coordinate the first discounted Team Building Day at the 2Fast2Soon Facility, RAF Scampton.

This was the first of four planned events and saw members of Lincoln IAM, Boston and Lincolnshire Advanced Bikers come together for an excellent day.

The 12 attendees were split into groups of three and paired with an LRSP instructor. There were four activities to undertake as teams: blind folded driving, trailer reversing, skid pan session and driving simulator challenge. The day rounded off with a motoring knowledge quiz.

The blind folded driving was a real challenge and really showed the value of team work. From an initial time round the circuit of over 4 minutes, our final time around was 1 minute 56 seconds—all by working as a team.

I have a new found respect for caravan drivers as I found I am absolutely useless at reversing a trailer! Although we did improve as we practiced.

The skid pan session was a real eye opener proving that

no matter what experience you have, you never know how you'll react when panic sets in. Ady gave my team some valuable tips—we were travelling at around 30mph but an oversteer skid, even at this speed, is very scary.

Overall it was an excellent day, with good fun enjoyed by all who attended. Our thanks to Ady, Johnny, John and Alex for an excellent day.

We will link up with LRSP again in 2017 to provide discounted skid pan training in groups of three. The three hour sessions focus on how to deal with an emergency situation such as loss of brakes, steering, understeer/ oversteer, tyre blowout and more. They will be available to all local IAM group members at a discounted price through our partnership. Check out our future newsletter for details of the events.

#### DEAD? Or dead slow?

If you only do one thing today: Take ten minutes of your time to go on the internet and watch the Dead Slow campaign launched by the British Horse Society. It can be found at www.bhs.org.uk/safety-and-accidents/dead-slow


With an increasing number of reported accidents and incidents involving riders and cars, the BHS have launched a campaign to make drivers aware of the need to slow down to 15mph when they encounter horses on the road, and give riders plenty of room. To demonstrate best practice in driving and riders, they have produced the video.



The campaign, which is backed by the police and road safety organisations, carried out research which showed that 75% of accidents happened because the vehicle passed the horse without allowing enough space, while over a quarter of respondents said that they had to deal with driver road rage during the incident.

The British Horse Society works closely with Government and local authorities, cycling groups and commercial transport firms to educate and change driver behaviour. Working tirelessly to ensure that all equestrians have access to riding outdoors without having to negotiate traffic on the roads, a key focus of the Society is the protection off road routes.

The BHS encourages horse riders to wear hi-viz gear at all times on the road. Even in bright sunlight it can be hard for a driver to see a horse.





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#### WHO'S WHO

## Mike's brief history of time...

Life started in Washingborough in the early damage if we hit one (oops). 50's (that's 1950's!) up to the age of 4. During this time the first of two interests in vehicles was whether the local bus that came past the window, had a starting handle stuck out the front? The second, was keeping an ear out for the arrival of the bakers van so I could purvey the tray of cakes as he opened the rear doors and sneak off with a cake. Only to have my ear bent later as Mother would have had to pay for it!

We then upgraded from the small stone cottage to a council house in Lincoln where, by the age of 10 or 11yrs and courtesy of our valve driven B&W BBC TV, I recall watching a car programme showing the drivers view ahead while maintaining a commentary. I thought to myself; blimey, Dad's got a lot to think about!

The motorbike era arrived by the early 60's, having been gifted with a 150cc 2stroke "James" complete with 3speed gearbox. Only to find it needed a complete re-build to make it roadworthy.

Having 'graduated' from an RAC-ACU (Auto Cycle Union) training scheme at the time, I was then able to pass the ministry test by going "round the block" in the Lindum Terrace area, including the examiner risking his health by stepping out into the road so an emergency stop could be demonstrated, followed by a few highway code questions....and passed, much to my relief.

This made my commuting easier as an apprentice machine tool maintenance fitter at Ruston Bucvrus. The workshop being about the middle of what is now B&O on Tritton Road.

The car era then arrived around the mid' 60s, after moving to Branston, with Dad in his Morris Oxford Traveller with a "4 on the floor" gearbox. Thankfully not as his previous Saloon version with "column change". Finding reverse was something

An early experience down a single track road being faced with an on-coming car, Dad said 'you'll have to move onto the grass" so I did, still doing 30mph....to the sound of him yelling SLOW DOWN! He pointed out that quite often little drainage channels were dug out across the verges which could be hiding under the grass and didn't want to incur any suspension

To prep' for the test I finished off with some lessons in a Morris Minor with Dennis Beasley an ex-police driving instructor at £1.00 an hour. Yes that's only 20shillings.

Early 70's then arrived, still in Branston but now working as an Outworker covering Installation and commissioning with Ruston Gas Turbines based in Lincoln. About that time I recall seeing an add' in the 'paper ... and that little seed planted in my childhood memory must have woken up... getting me onto an Advanced Driving night school class at Cherry Willingham

One of my two brothers, Pete, and Dad also signed up to what proved to be a very interesting course. I don't remember the 'lecturer' or the allocated observer that followed, but Bob Hardisty (another former police driver) was instrumental behind it

During THE TEST I was overtaking a lorry and noticed the speedo' had crept up to 56mph. Nothing wrong in that you may think, but it was in the middle of a national fuel crisis with a countrywide limit of 50mph.

And yes, the examiner did mention that in his de-brief, but accepted in the circumstances it was better to complete the manoeuvre to minimise time in the danger area – and gave me a pass, phew!

Brother and Dad also passed ok. The year in question – 1974.

Some time later whilst working on a site in Iraq near Basrah (when it was safe to) I tried applying my new found driving skill to a willing Iraqi Engineer on some of the oil field roads. Trying to get the 'system' right even if there wasn't much traffic! Only to find the local Driving Test consisted of driving in reverse around a figure of 8 course - staying within marked lines, dubiously guided with much arm waving and shouting by spectating members of the local public.

Probably explained why some of the locals couldn't drive forwards very well! They mainly relied on "El ham dú lilla" i.e. "By the grace of God".

Only completed a couple of years outworking, finishing with 3months in Iran, before taking up residence back in the

Lincoln office responsible for programming and pricing of gas turbine installation and commissioning activity. Thankfully, at the same time, renewing a female friendship\* that had started pre-Iran. Only to then visit 8 more countries\*\* over the next 10yrs plus visiting the North Sea Cormorant platform in a Chinook helicopter-ter-terter... all supporting Sales enquiries, but only for days at a time.

Thankfully surviving several rounds of redundancies and company name changes and formats (European Gas Turbines, Alsthom, DeMag De Laval, etc) finally retiring from Siemens in 2015 after 42

This year entering my 43<sup>rd</sup> year of membership of the IAM.

\*The friendship continued through "coaching" her up towards the standard driving test - without falling out! Later becoming engaged to Sue who became my wife in August '77. That will be 38yrs on the 20<sup>th</sup> of this month.

We have a son Scott married to Alisa, living in Rugby and a daughter, Natalie and fiancé Jamie who live in New Zealand north island in Keri-Keri (Bay of Islands area).

They are getting married in September in Welffleet, not far from Jamie's own home town, in......Cape Cod! Near Boston in the USA. We are already booked to go. Whether we get to visit New Zealand in the future.....? (We've done Rugby)

Must go now, need to contact a new Associate so I can get some new National Observer practice in.




