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ADVANCED DRIVING WITH IAM ROADSMART

Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership's Communications Manager, John Siddle, recounts his experience of IAM RoadSmart's Advanced Driver Course

The next stage was to go online and sign up to the Advanced Driver Course, I got the feeling of 'what have I let myself in for'.

The Book



Just a few days after subscribing the book arrived. It was easy to understand, logically set out with a few acronyms that I'd have to learn, but on the whole good common sense driving. Some discipline was needed around junctions and roundabouts: thinking about what I had taken for granted over the years and analysing a little more as to why, what if and how?

#### Run 1

Luckily Ash works 5 minutes from me, so we have agreed that Monday lunchtimes are now given over to Advanced Driving! Starting with our cockpit drill, we move off through the city on to quite a mixture of roads: narrow, wide, single track (with an abandoned car left in the road) opposing traffic in conflict, speed limit changes coming thick and fast as Ash guides me around the chosen route. Towards the end of our drive Ash tells me the next step, the acronyms, spoken thoughts and some habits that 36 years of driving have embedded in me that need to change! Ash is the consummate professional and

#### **Observation Drive**

Last June I contacted IAM RoadSmart to take a free advanced taster drive. My observer, Ash, relaxed me straight away and explained there were no expectations I just had to drive how I do normally and he would assess how I had driven.

I have always prided myself on my driving, whether it is two wheels or four, having driven all over the world including through jungles, deserts open highway – if it had wheels and an engine I would give it a go! Don't get me wrong, I've had the odd mishap, but I was always able to look back and say why it had happened. One or two were my fault where I recognise I could have done things better and, potentially, avoided it.

We pulled back into the carpark after what seemed ten minutes but had been just under an hour, Ash commended my driving, picked up a couple of things where improvements could be made and thanked me for such a pleasant drive!

#### Run 2

A wet and dreary lunchtime (British Summer!) gets us out among the traffic. I have read the book and looked at the list of phrases for my spoken thoughts! We make our way to the upper part of the city, moving around larger vehicles giving them space as they need, very quickly into a narrow village road, onto back lanes where passing places are an option, looking ahead Ash encourages me to look and think further ahead than I have previously, bringing up relevant spoken thoughts clearly shows I am trying to anticipate anything and everything: what if, what if what if - options! Always more options than getting involved in someone else's mistake, or worse, collision. The rain tries to spoil the drive but fails, I mentioned the road surface: wet, greasy and then back to dry as I progressed. Good positive drive, Ash gives me more to think about for the next Monday lunchtime. I manage to drop my main bad habit of braking whilst changing down. Spoken thoughts as I drive... continued on Page 2





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# **ADVANCED DRIVING WITH IAM ROADSMART**

Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership's Communications Manager, John Siddle, recounts his experience of IAM RoadSmart's Advanced Driver Course

#### Run 3

Check drive with a Master Driver! Kelvin takes us out on rural roads in the south of the County. "IPSGA" is clearly taking over my driving, some minor habits are hard to break but I only applied the brakes once whilst changing down! The flow of driving is getting better, I often prided myself that I could almost see another driver was potentially going to become a conflict; it seems there shouldn't be any surprises if I use the system. My spoken thoughts are covering everything I see, the small, the slight, the insignificant and all of the bigger stuff too – information highway!

#### Run 4

A new route today, with awkward junctions that will challenge any driver. Work load is going up. Finessing the drive, using all the lessons so far to smooth out the ride. Nothing is a surprise or difficult. Braking points identified, sometimes too early. Getting there!

#### Run 5

Late September and everything is falling into line, a couple of hesitations, gear change timing. Possibly over thinking ahead of myself. Apply the system!

#### Run 6

Everything seems to have fallen into place, practice this whilst groups/lincolnam

#### The Test

I met my examiner, Andy, in Morton and set off on what became the most enjoyable driving test I have encountered! Pointing out skid marks on the road, looking long, making progress, anticipating but not assuming. The one and a half hours flew by. Andy's words "Congratulations! Good verbal understanding of HTBaBD, HC & RC. Excellent commentary. Great observational links, e.g. noting skid marks prior to bends and farm entrances. Your easy joining of the A1 kept you in lane 1 when (to be fair a VERY early) change to lane 2 would have prevented a slight loss of progress when a stationary car emerged from n/s minor junction and you were baulked by 2 vans slowly approaching from behind in lane 2. And that is all I can say! You were consistently Safe, systematic, smooth and made progress where appropriate. You would make an excellent candidate for the Masters programme. Well done!"

#### Summary

The whole experience was a pleasure. I thought I was a fairly good driver, without sounding arrogant given my experience and the work I do. That said, this has opened up a whole new driving style for me and cleaned out a couple of bad habits that I was not aware of. The only thing I question is, why did I not do this years ago? Thank you IAM RoadSmart, Ash, Kelvin and Andy for taking me through a better way to drive.

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### **GROUP NEWS**

#### Road Safety Summit success November 2017

We were pleased to join Marc Jones, Police and Crime Commissioner, for Lincolnshire's first Road Safety Summit. Around 100 delegates attended the summit, which was organised by the Police and Crime Commissioner Marc Jones and the Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership.

The summit highlighted a number of innovative road safety practices, including 'Operation Snap' which was launched two years ago in Wales. Operation Snap is an initiative which allows the public to share dashcam footage on a special secure website, so that police can investigate driving



offences. Other innovations highlighted at the conference included a project run in Stockholm, which used fines from traffic offences to fund a prize draw for drivers identified as sticking to speed limits.

Deputy Chief Constable Craig Naylor, who is chair of the LRSP, told the delegates that it was crucial to focus on the four pillars of engineering, education, enforcement and evaluation: "evaluation is often forgotten but is critical to success. We have limited resources and must make sure we focus on the most effective solutions," he said.

The summit was also used to launch the new enhanced Community Speed Watch Scheme. Under the scheme, residents will be given appropriate training and radar guns to check the speed of passing motorists. Drivers caught speeding by the volunteers will be sent a warning letter and road safety advice, with repeat offenders getting a visit from police.

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# ANATOMY OF AN ACCIDENT

### Mirror, mirror on the door, remind me please to look once more!

Back in the mists of time (late '70s, Saxilby).... "I'll pop and get the fish & chips dear, mind if I borrow your car?" (A Hillman Imp worth about £250).

Driving back from the chip shop with said lunch, I had noticed a car some distance behind which had been gaining ground.

Rounding a right-hand curve with restricted view, the road widens on the nearside and straightens, at which point I interior mirror check 'Information' - and it's clear behind back to the bend. 'Position' - tracking the centre line. 'Signal' - for the approaching side road to the right, which had a large bush on the corner capable of hiding a car approaching from the right. So, on approach you tend to keep an eye on the swept area behind the bush - all dear, 'Speed' - ok, 'Gear' good.....

At this same point in time, in a block of sheltered housing at a window facing the junction, an elderly gentleman in the middle of his lunch and looking out the window, said to his wife "I think there's going to be an (CRUNCH!) accident.

Also at this point in time, about 400yds away in a separate street, at home, my wife heard a loud bang which turned her stomach over as she was expecting me back any time soon and coincidentally had recently discovered she now 'open' window if the lady, who's (car) was expecting our first child.

........ 'Accelerating' (lightly) into the turn...... At THIS point in time, I discovered three things simultaneously:

- The sound of a car engine in my right ear.
- The presence of a car 1/2 way alongside.
- A load bang and the sudden redirection of both vehicles now heading towards some public seating in front of the sheltered housing.

'Information' - Possible demolition of Public seating. 'Position' - mounting the kerb. 'Speed' - possibly excessive for driving onto the verge but reducing rapidly. 'Gear' - who cares! (I was dinging onto the steering wheel out of a self-preservation instinct). The clutch pedal possibly making an impression in the floor! 'Acceleration' - negative/ not currently appropriate. Both cars stopping in parallel, just accident" short of and facing the seating.

Pausing briefly to assess the situation I was thankful we weren't a few feet to the left else a sizeable tree trunk would have been involved. Not a lot of "crumple zone" to absorb it either, as EURO NCAP wasn't invented until 1997. From an aromatic point of view there was no smoke, no petrol, no hot offside sill that had been crushed. oil or radiator water smells. Missing the tree was useful as the IMP is rear engined, meaning the petrol tank is at the front. It also means the petrol pipe and car heater pipes pass along the nearside sill, so at least they were safe.

This lack of invention mentioned above, would explain why I had been saved the effort of 'winding' (an old millennia thing) the window down for two reasons:

- Most of the offside bodywork had been stoved-in pinning the window winder area against the side of my seat.
- The door glass had been completely shattered.

This did enable me to enquire through the body was pressing closely against mine, was OK? She nodded yes. I confess, at this juncture, I limited myself to a short expletive along the lines of WTF! before alighting via the nearside door.

Recalling advice heard over the years -Witnesses – are there any? Asking two guys propping up a garden wall .... "we heard a bang and came out to see ..." OK, thanks, cheers.

Ah! There's another, walking towards us, 100vds away ... excuse me sir did vou see that accident? "Yes, I did, I saw you turn in front of that car" (me thinks overr, that's technically correct but doesn't put me in a very good light), took his details and returned to the incident scene. Only to find a police car pulling up. The village had a police office even then. Someone must have called them

although not necessary, as no-one was injured.

Statements were taken, including my claim to have been indicating. The policeman said that's ok as his colleague had already checked they were working ok. This was relief on my part as the wiring loom runs through the

I then noticed an elderly gentleman making his way towards us aided by his Zimmer frame and appeared to be hailing us. He explained he had seen the incident and pointed towards his dining room window along the front of the sheltered housing. He then said those magic words "I saw you indicating approaching the junction." Thankyou sir, would you kindly repeat that to the policeman in the car please.

On discovering the cars were still driveable we were able to return to our respective homes. The fish & chips having now gone cold. They weren't re-heated as I had managed to crush them on my earlier exit through the passenger door! It later transpired that the chap who said "I saw you turn in front of that car" was related to the driver!

I later made a social visit to the elderly gentleman to thank him for taking the trouble to come out and speak to us. Without his testimony I would not have been able to successfully claim on the other party's insurer for the write-off value of the car.

Using this money we were able to privately arrange for a full repair of the IMP to be carried out. This involved replacement of half the side of the car from a donor vehicle. Unfortunately, this was a different colour, so I ended up re-painting, by brush, the whole car in a unique fetching shade of dark blue Finnegan's Hammerite paint.

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Every year, our motivation increases after Christmas and we spend the New Year planning our goals, such as getting fitter or eating more healthily, but many gym memberships feels unloved by February. Richard Gladman, head of driving and riding standards, suggests a few New Year Resolutions that are easy to keep and will improve your driving and keep you safe throughout the year:

- <u>N</u>ew year, new car. Think about the effect your car can have on the environment. Those short trips have the biggest impact so look into alternatives. If you are looking to get a new car, make sure you research its emissions and road tax costs. Choose one with the latest safety kit such as autonomous emergency braking (AEB) because we all need a guardian angel at times.
- <u>Eyesight:</u> The NHS suggests having an eye test every two years. It is your responsibility to ensure you're fit to drive. Getting your eyes tested regularly will also show up any concerns at an early stage. You can check your vision yourself can you read a number plate clearly from 20 metres?
- <u>W</u>eather: Heed weather warnings all year around. If the weather is really bad, consider postponing your journey until a more appropriate time, or plan another method of transport if possible.
- <u>Y</u>ear-round maintenance: Clean your windows, lights, mirrors and number plates regularly. You should spend around 10 minutes every week checking your vehicle's fluid levels, tyre pressure, lights, tread depth and windscreen wipers.
- <u>E</u>co-driving: A planned drive is an economical drive. Having a good sense of your vehicle's power and gears will save fuel, and makes it safer to drive. There is no point in racing up to a red traffic light!
- <u>A</u>nticipate: Consider what the traffic and other people around you may do, especially at traffic lights, roundabouts and junctions. Observing, anticipating and planning should be at the heart of your driving.
- <u>**R**</u>efuel: Be sure to keep an eye on your tank, especially when embarking upon long journeys. Refuelling early saves you the stress of trying to find a petrol station in an area you don't know. Running out of fuel causes hundreds of motorway breakdowns every year.

Richard says: "The New year is a common time for people to reflect and evaluate their goals for the upcoming year. Why not begin by incorporating your driving behaviour into your list of resolutions for 2018? Why not resolve to make it better this year?"

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## **FORDIE'S FESTIVE WORLD**

First things first, I should add my congratulations to Ash on winning the Fred Welch Rose Bowl. It is quite an achievement for the group to win it two consecutive years (2016 to Roger) and Glenys Allerton won it some years ago. I may be wrong, but I can't recall a group winning the Rose Bowl three times.

With the dark nights upon us, a new hazard is beginning to emerge, vehicles parked by the kerb, facing oncoming traffic with their headlights full on! This is downright dangerous as it temporarily blinds the approaching driver and makes distance and stopping room very hard to judge. I'm sure, if challenged, the offending driver will say "I only stopped a minute to drop off/pick-up". Not much help if it causes an accident, so remember, "headlights off when stopped!"

I see a new sports car is being made, the TVR "Griffith", powered by a five litre engine, capable of 200mph (on a track I hope!) and takes off faster than a couple of scalded cats! Absolutely no good to me but thank heaven one British manufacturer is building a "proper" car with some serious "grunt". Wouldn't mind the price of insurance for a month's wage!

I also read that some company has fitted an ELECTRIC motor to an E type Jaguar: is nothing sacred? I've no idea of performance but substituting that silky 4.2 litre straight six or the glorious V12 for an electric motor— words fail me! An idea I've been toying with for some time was to sell my motorbike and buy a motor scooter just to potter about on. Well, I've finally taken the plunge (mid Nov) and signed up to buy a brand new Piaggio "Liberty" scooter, 125cc twist and go job. I've had a good look at it, like the spec and set-up, paid my deposit and hope to take delivery in the New Year, subject to shifting the motorbike fairly quickly. Thinking back to all the motorbikes I've owned over the years, I hadn't envisaged myself opting for a scooter but "Anno Domini" comes upon you and I think the scooter will serve my needs well!

Now on a somewhat different note, the amount of traffic coming into or through Lincoln has built up tremendously over recent months. It is not unusual to see Broadgate at a standstill from the bottom of Lindum Hill to South Park. Yarborough Road from Long Leys Road to the Avenue and Carholme Road/Newland/Mint street all bunged up with vehicles. Are they all just passing through or going somewhere in the City? 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# **KNOW YOUR STUFF**

IAM's Driving Safety Culture Survey 2017

IAM RoadSmart's third annual Safety Culture Survey which examines the attitudes and concerns of UK drivers, has found that for the third year running their biggest worries are people updating social media or sending text messages while driving, drink or drug driving and mobile phone use.

Drivers checking social media is the biggest single perceived threat that road users feel - slightly higher than those who text and email, and closely followed by drink and drug drivers.

The survey of more than 2,000 motorists found that more than 90% of those surveyed thought that the dangers caused by people accessing social media or email messages while driving was a significant threat to their personal safety and that the problem is increasing, with 80% believing the problem more significant




than three years ago.

### Survey Summary

□ Driver distraction linked to all forms of mobile phone use remains the biggest issue affecting drivers' perceptions of safety.

□ Concerns on congestion have dropped slightly since last year but it remains in second place as an issue which has got worse in the last three years.

□ Speeding in residential areas remains very unacceptable to most, but 40% felt it was acceptable to speed at 5mph above the urban limit.



□ Only two types of behaviour were considered acceptable by the majority of drivers. These were driving up to 10 miles per hour over the limit on a motorway and talking on a hands-free mobile.

□ Reflecting their worries about mobile phone use the vast majority of drivers still report that they themselves have not used a phone illegally or unsafely in the last month.

□ Support remains strong at 79% for a lower drink drive limit in England and Wales in line with Scotland and most of Europe.

□ Just under six out of ten drivers still want the police to treat drink and drug driving enforcement as their top priority. This is placed well ahead of enforcing mobile phone use, speeding, untaxed vehicles or driver aggression. Of the choices available seatbelt evasion was seen as the least important law to be enforced.

□ Most drivers would still need to be convinced about the need for new laws to protect cyclists such as making the driver responsible for any collisions with a vulnerable road user in an urban area. Only 30% of those surveyed would support such a law.

□ Drivers are evenly split on making 20mph the default speed limit in urban areas.

□ The new law allowing learner drivers on motorways is supported by 72% of drivers.

□ Year on vear more drivers agree that all drivers should be encouraged to improve their driving skills by taking post-test training.
