ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING HELD ON TUESDAY 30TH APRIL 2019

It's that time of the year again - our Annual General Meeting (just where has the last year gone ???). It was great to see everyone at the AGM. Here's a very brief report of the main part of the meeting. The meeting was held at Calderfields Golf Club, lovely venue, lovely room. However very subdued lighting with twinkling lights in the ceiling - was however not much fun or ideal for shorthand note-taking (enough of my moaning!) Here's a quick resume of the formal part of the meeting:

- Minutes from the previous year basically everyone seemed to agree that the minutes were ok and I didn't make them up!
- Matters arising from the Minutes fortunately there were none

• Chairman's Report

Martin Goad, our Chairman, gave a brief resume of the Group's activities during the past year. He commenced by welcoming our President, Trevor Poxon, and our guest speakers Lorraine and Geoff from the Midland Freewheeler Blood Biker Group. Martin then thanked everyone within the Group whose dedication and hard work help it to run. Congratulations also to our successful Associates.

The Group's social activities were then reviewed - from the Quiz Nights (which were great), visit to the Leicester Space Centre, to the successful talk on taking your Masters by Robbie Downing. The forthcoming committee changes were reviewed - Karl Spooner is stepping down, after many years, as Treasurer, many thanks to Karl. Martin informed the meeting that this will be his last year as Chairman. Now on to Karl, for his final Treasurer's report:

• Treasurers Report - Karl Spooner our out-going Treasurer gave his Annual Report and Accounts for the year ended 2018. He informed the meeting that this is the last time he will be standing on the committee as Treasurer, after many years., due to work commitments. The income and expenditure account had been circulated to meeting members prior to the meeting, and Karl commenced by detailing the income received. One of the largest items of income was for £300 - thanks to Lloyds Bank!. Karl explained that this is due to the problems encountered with Lloyds Bank in amending details of our account, so far they have credited us with two amounts of £150 as compensation, therefore the £300 income. Expenditure: the largest amount in expenditure is for room hire, ie Calderfields Golf Club and Aldridge CA. The other large item of expenditure were the shirts and fleeces purchased for Observers. Finally, in summary, Karl informed the meeting that he has been Treasurer since 1993 just after he passed his test. He has enjoyed his time working on the committee. 

Presentation by Trevor Poxon - our President

Trevor told us that he first became associated with the Walsall Group in 1989 when he was a newly appointed IAM examiner. He enjoyed a long career as a Police Officer, mainly on the Traffic Division. Following this he joined the IAM at Chiswick head office for several years before his retirement. He still enjoys his driving, he believes we are introducing people to the finest way of driving.

Presentation by Midland Freewheelers Blood Bikers Group:

Many thanks to Geoff - Fund Raising Manager and Lorraine, Chairman of the Midland Freewheelers Group for coming along and talking to us. Here's a very brief resume of their group and their activities:





Group Secretary, Josie, is also a member of the Blood Bikers Group. They will transport anything for the NHS that can safely fit it onto a motorcycle. Overall, they save the NHS an incredible amount of money. In addition to the motorbikes, they have two Skoda cars which are used especially at night and when the weather is bad.

They operate 24/7, all year, all weather. There are 43 other such groups throughout the country with 100% voluntary membership, without payment. The organisation started in London in 1962 and subsequently evolved throughout the country. There is not an area of the country that is not covered by a Blood Biker group. There is an umbrella group NAB which lobbies the government.

What they do and transport: They can relay products via help from co-ordinators throughout the country, linking up with other groups. They do not relay human organs, this is dealt with by the NHS. During the week they deliver breast milk for premature babies which goes to the Womens' Hospital, Birmingham and other areas, including Wales. They have not long commenced a service delivering a chemotherapy drug from Birmingham QE Hospital across to the Children's Hospital, Birmingham. This drug only has a 90min life from production to delivery to the patient. They have three time slots for the safe delivery of this drug.

Their funding: They do not receive any funding from the Government or the NHS. They fund raise money from numerous and varied sources. It costs approximately £11 each job that they do. Last year they did just over 3,000 jobs! They do not run any buildings or premises so all the money raised goes towards running costs entirely.

At the end of their presentation Geoff and Lorraine were thanked warmly by our Chairman and audience, who then had the opportunity to admire the motorbike brought along by the Blood Bikers.


The Holiday season is coming, including Bank Holidays! so here's some early advice from the IAM

If you're planning a holiday getaway then be sure to read our tips on how you can make your journey a safe and stress-free one. Here's IAM RoadSmart's head of driving and riding standards, Richard Gladman, to help you prepare for your trip. A little preparation goes a long way.

- Take some time to check your vehicle inside and out before you set off. Check the tyre pressure and fluid levels are right and make sure your car ancillaries are working properly.
- Secure your luggage in your boot so it's out of the way and doesn't obstruct your view
- Give yourself plenty of time for the journey and check the news for any traffic updates and roadworks nearby
- If you're travelling during the early hours of the day or late in the evening make sure you
 take some rest beforehand and eat something light so you don't feel sluggish before you
 leave
- If you plan on using a sat-nav don't forget to programme in the destination before you leave and check it. Leave plenty of time for the journey so you don't find yourself pushed for time.
- Make sure you take regular rest breaks to split up the journey when driving on a long, boring stretch of a motorway. It's good practise to stop at least every two hours

With so much planning involved in a holiday, many of us forget about the first bit - how we get to our destination. If your journey is a long one, take some time to plan where and when you will be taking a break - just so you can get a little rest and have some water to stay hydrated. Enjoy the journey and more importantly, enjoy the getaway.





- The world's first automobile was developed by Carl Benz in 1885. The top speed of the motor car was 16 km per hour. It had a one cylinder four-stroke engine installed horizontally on a specifically designed chassis. It was known as the Benz Patent Motorwagen.
- First time in America and the world: the world's first electric traffic signal is put into place on the corner of Euclid Avenue and East 105th Street in Cleveland, Ohio, on 5th August in 1914. Also, the first center painted dividing line appeared in 1911, in Michigan; the first "No Left Turn" sign would debut in Buffalo, New York, in 1916; and left-hand drive became standard in American cars in 1908.
- Leonardo da Vinci invented the first car in 1478 on paper. In 2004, a replica of the car was crafted and was kept in the Institute and Museum of the history of Science in Florence, Italy.
- Did you ever wonder how the names of some of the Volkswagen cars were coined? The company uses the various types of winds for the purpose. For example, the Jetta means "jet stream", the Passat means "trade winds", and the Polo means "Polar Winds."

With the holiday season approaching, now is also the time for a

Spring Clean - and that includes your car tyres!

It's important to regularly check your tyres to see if they're fit and healthy to help you get from A to B safely. That's why IAM RoadSmart's Head of Driving and Riding Standards, Richard Gladman, has put together some top tyre tips to help you <u>stay safe on the road</u>:

- Check your tyres regularly. We recommend weekly vehicle checks which include inspecting tyre pressure, tread depth and the overall condition.
- Ensure that your tyre's tread depth is at least 1.6mm for a car (however, we recommend 3mm), and 1mm across $\frac{3}{4}$ of the width of the tread pattern and with visible tread on the remaining $\frac{1}{4}$ for motorcycles over 50cc. If your motorcycle is up to 50cc, all the grooves of the original tread pattern must be clearly visible.
- The 20p test check your tyre tread with a 20p by placing it into the main groove of your tyre. The outer band of the 20p coin should be obscured when it is inserted.



Make sure your tyres have the correct pressure. You can find this information in the vehicle manufacturers' handbook, on the inside of the fuel filler cap or driver's door sill, and you can get this information when purchasing tyres.
